A SALEM dispatch says: "It is rumored about Salem that Secretary Kincaid, who has always been a silver republican, will abide by his convictions and go over to the silver forces. The recent action of the state league of republicans has had the effect of causing many conscientious silver men to leave the old party where they are no longer given any consideration."

The Dingley deficit for January was \$7,901,484. For the seven months from July 1 to Feb. 1 the deficit (not reckoning the Pacific Railroad payments) was \$51,901,823. It is not strange that Mr. McKinley prefers to talk in glittering generalities about currency reform, rather than to dilate on the beauties of this worse-than-war tariff for bounties and a deficit.—N. And it might have added that if you take the voters who honestly believe in free silver out of the republican party of Oregon, you will have but a corporal's guard of bankers, corporation attorneys and office seekers left.

The present administration, which loves (?) the workingman so dearly that it is pushing a bill through congress to restrict the immigration of hard working, honest and intelligent Europeans, announces that Japanese immigration is to be free and unrestricted, and that Japs may become naturalized as citizens. Now, if anyone can tell wherein Japanese immigration is more to be desired even than Chinese, he ought to speak out.—Roseburg Review.

Some one has remarked that we live in a grand country. We do. We live in a land of high mountains and high taxes; low valleys and low wages; big crooked rivers and big crooked state-men; big lakes, big strikes, big pumpkins, big men with pumpkin heads; silver streams that gambol in the mountains and pious politicians who gamble in the night; roaring extracts and roaring orators; fast trains, fast horses, fast young men, and girls fast, faster, fastest; sharp lawyers, sharp financiers, sharp-toed shoes, noisy children, fertile plains that lie like a sheet of water; and thousands of newspapers that lie like thunder.—Ex.

The state tax levy has been set at 3 1/2 mills, and state taxes for 1898 will become due and payable on March 1st. In the state treasury there are piled up nearly a million dollars in the various funds. Not a dollar of this is being paid out, and yet in a few days the state treasurer will be punching the various country treasurers to remit the state taxes from the first monies received from tax collections in their counties; and not only that, but they will be charged interest on the taxes from the first of March. This is the condition which confronts the people of the state of Oregon today. By the time the legislature again meets all the state taxes will have again been collected and over a million dollars will have been taken from the avenues of trade and business and locked up to lie idle in the vaults of the state, or to be speculated upon by the Salem and Portland banks.

An Eastern Oregon paper tells of a man who sent to Portland for a chair bottom, paying 18 cents postage on it. The same kind of a chair bottom was being sold in a local store for 12 1/2 cents. There is a whole lecture for you.

Some people want to know what the democrats of Clackamas are going to do with the national or gold democrats. Palmer and Buckner received but 32 votes in Clackamas county and these 32 votes will probably be cast for republicans unless the citizens who cast same then are willing to stand on the Chicago platform and vote as true democrats should.

UNION or co-operation of populists, silver republicans and democrats in spring campaign will take place in nearly all the counties of the state. The counties which are doubtful are Wallowa, Union, Jackson, Josephine and Clackamas. Polk is the only county that has declared against union which was not unanimous by any means, and two sets of delegates ask to be seated at the populist state convention from that county.

There is much newspaper talk about union these days, many of the silver papers are advocating union while the republican papers are afraid they will unite? What is the difference between an administration republican and a national democrat? The same as a toad and a tadpole. They both believe in the gold standard, and "all the aperturances thereto." While the Bryan democrats, silver republicans and populists are a unit on the leading national questions. Unite? Of course they will. You might as well try to sweep back the Mississippi river with the tail feather of a goose as to try to prevent union during the next campaign as above outlined. It will come as surely as the tax collector, and all the howling on the part of any man or set of men cannot prevent it any more than they could stop a Kansas cyclone.
