EASTER SERVICES.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

Easter was observed in the Presbyterian church in the usual simple manner. The decorations were appropriate and the music was in keeping with the theme of the day, the anthem being "He Is Risen." The pastor preached on "The Power Of The Resurrection."

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH.

The most successful Easter celebration and services ever held by the Congregational church were those of last Sabbath. The decorations were elaborate and beautiful, Oregon and California flowers and lilies in rich abundance, skillfully and artistically arranged, presented a most charming array. The morning service opened auspiciously with a large and representative congregation. The musical program was without doubt the best ever rendered at any Easter service in this city, and the large choir received the praise of all present. Mrs. Strickler was director, and Mrs. Jennie White presided at the organ with her usual skill. The subject of Dr. Butler's sermon was "A Visit To The Place Where The Lord Lay." Matt 28,6.

At the evening service, the lecture room and galleries were thrown open to accommodate the throng that filled the great building to overflowing. Every part of the program was nicely rendered, and was worthy of praise. The duet, "O! Salutaris," by Mrs. E. E. Charman and Mrs. W. B. Wiggins, was especially good. A delightful feature of the evening to the church and Sunday school, was a presentation to the superintendent, C. H. Dye, of a beautiful set of books, a gift from the school, as a token of regard for faithful and efficient services as superintendent. Dr. Butler made the presentation in a very fitting manner, and Mr. Dye replied in a few very feeling remarks. Each teacher and officer was also presented a beautiful bouquet, from the Sunday school, by the Misses Edna Caulfield and Vesta Broughton, and so closed one of the most inspiring and delightful of days for the church.

METHODIST CHURCH.

The morning text at the M. E. church was "If Christ Be Not Raised." At the close of the sermon the baptism of eleven adults took place, after which there was a reception of members. In the evening after a special song service, there was a brief discourse by the pastor on the text, "Sir, We Would See Jesus."

EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

Services were held on Easter morning at St. Paul's Episcopal church, Rev. Wetherdon, of Portland, officiating. The church was beautifully and artistically decorated with Easter lilies, palms, Oregon grape and and wild flowers. Owing to the illness of the organist, the music that had been prepared for the occasion was indefinitely postponed. The minister spoke on "The Resurrection." The church was filled to its utmost capacity.

BAPTIST CHURCH.

The decorations at the Baptist church consisted of the Oregon wild grape and great bunches of graceful wild lilies, contributed by the Sunday school children. Among the decorations were fine palms in ornamental pots and blooming plants from Mr. Roake's greenhouse, all of which were tastefully arranged by Mrs. C. O. T. Williams and Mrs. A. S. Dresser.

The music, under the direction of Mr. A. S. Dresser, was especially fine. Several anthems, an arrangement from Il Trovatore, and a sacred duet composed by Mr. Dresser and sung by himself and wife, gave great pleasure.

Rev. Mr. Rugg gave an impressive sermon from the text "Come See The Place Where The Lord Lay," showing how we are continually coming up to sepulchres of dead hopes, blasted ambitions, diverted purposes and life currents changed—but in the providence of God to each there is a resurrection morn, bringing glory out of death and a hallelujah instead of a dirge. The risen Lord bringing hope and promise of all things to the Christian for the life that now is and the eternal life beyond.

CATHOLIC CHURCH.

Services were held at the Catholic church Easter at 8 a. m. and 10:30 a. m. At the first mass, the children of parish sang the Easter carols and anthems, and at the 10:30 service solemn high mass was celebrated. The choir rendered Weigand's mass in E flat major, interspersed with an offertory, by Gounod, and other appropriate songs.

In the evening the church was again filled with people to join in the Easter service. The music was of a superior order, and was most appropriate to the occasion. Following is the program which was rendered at this service:

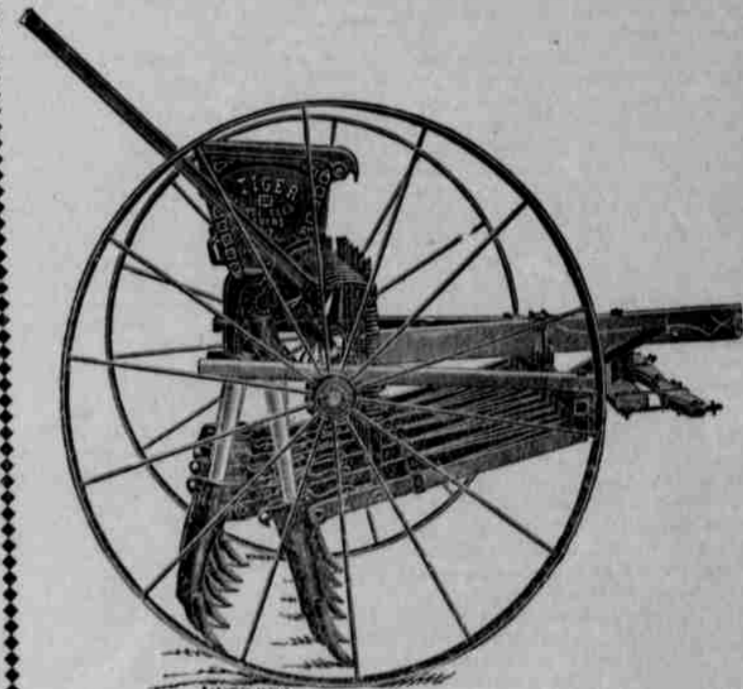
