### Union County Platform.

Resolved, That the people, Democrat and silver republican parties of Clackamas county assembled in convention, fully and heartily reaffirm and endorse the platform of the people, Democrat and silver republican parties as adopted at Portland by the recent state convention.

Resolved, That the migratory system of district attorney should be substituted by each county having its own county attorney, at a moderate salary, whose duty it shall be to protect all county interests, including all prosecutions.

Resolved, That we demand such changes in our laws as are necessary to provide for precinct organization, giving each precinct power to elect its own assessor, road supervisor, and all local officers.

Resolved, That we view with alarm the constantly increasing expenditures of the county court, and demand more careful and economical administration in that office.

We pledge our candidates to do all in their power to amend our law fixing the salary of county officers in Clackamas county so that the yearly salaries shall be: For sheriff, \$1000; county clerk, \$800; recorder, \$700; treasurer, \$600; county judge, \$500; superintendent of public instruction, \$400; county surveyor, \$300. This amendment to be referred to the voters of Clackamas county not later than the annual school election in March, 1899, to take effect as soon as it is approved by the majority of those voting.

LET Oregon set the example by electing the entire union reform ticket.

PHIL METSCHAN got it in the neck. The state treasurer's office was so foul that even the republicans called for a cleaning out.

IF L. L. PORTER thinks he can be elected joint senator by heaping abuse on his opponent, a minister in his dirty sheet, he is mistaken.

EVERY candidate on the Union ticket fills the Jeffersonian test of honesty and capability. The people should see that all of them are elected.

MAX RAMSAY was sent as delegate to congressional convention and instructed to support Hermann, but he voted for Tongue and is now enjoying his promised reward, a federal position in Portland. After election he can spend all his time there as the people of Clackamas county are not going to elect a third turner with a government job to offer.

ONE republican precinct chairman is complaining because he has not received some of republican campaign fund and claims he cannot carry his precinct unless he has money for beer, etc. This man put up his own money last election and was paid in promises and he will probably do so again although he says he will not.

THE republican candidates and their steering committee might properly be called a lawyers' brigade. The lawyers on the district and county ticket are, T. A. McBride, T. J. Cleaton, L. L. Porter, Geo. C. Brownell. Lawyers A. S. Dresser and G. B. Dimick are secretaries of county committee and are attempting to steer the combination ticket through.

He says U'Ren will easily defeat Brownell for the state senate and predicts the election of the entire Clackamas county ticket. Mr. Barlow is a silver republican and was one of the first in the state to declare for the restoration of the white metal to its time honored position as a free and equal companion of gold at the ratio of 16 to 1.—Salem Independent

MR. PORTER is the candidate for joint senator who proposes to defeat Barkley. His plan is to induce the middle-rollers to unite for him. He claims they are all right in Clackamas, but it is very difficult to locate a single one in Marion. The program is to have the right men in each community secretly work up the boys, and poison their minds against his opponent. This is to be done by all manner of pledges and promises. The question arises, how will Mr. Porter "work" the middle rollers where there are none? Why doesn't he get out before the people and advocate some principles if he's got any?—Salem Journal.

WHY does the Dingley-Gage combination propose legislation to convert the United States into a gold oligarchy and the people into serfs just at this time? Because they desire to utilize the patriotism of the country and win in the excitement, while the attention of the country is directed to the war, what could not be done in time of peace. They understand that their game cannot be played while the people are looking on, just as well as the gambling sharp who deals marked cards or plays with loaded dice does that his scheme must fail unless he can divert the attention of his victims from the tricks he plays.

MR. T. T. GEER the candidate for governor spoke at Toledo in Lincoln county on May 2. We understand that they advertised that there was to be a joint discussion between Mr. Geer and Mr. King, the opposing nominee. This was done to draw a large crowd and was successful. The Oregonian stated that Mr. Geer expressed his regrets that Mr. King was never invited to attend such meeting either directly or indirectly. He had challenged Mr. Geer for joint discussion which Mr. Geer refused. Mr. Geer in a private letter to one of his republican friends stated that he would not object to dividing time with Mr. King at any of his appointed places for speaking, but no notice was ever extended to either the Union Campaign Committee or Mr. King to this effect either by letter or otherwise. These are the tactics adopted by the republican party for the purpose of drawing a crowd and misleading the people as to the true situation of the facts. They were never known to conduct a campaign in a fair and honorable manner and indications are they never will be known to do so.

GO it alone? Certainly. Let the democrats and populists who favor a union of all forces opposed to gold bugism have a separate ticket. Let the middle-of-the-rollers have another ticket, the single-tax advocates another, and those who favor socialism still another. This will make it dead easy for the republicans to carry the elections, retire the greenbacks, provide for payment of government bonds in gold only, issue \$500,000,000 in new gold bonds, build up a great bank trust with control of all paper money in circulation and completely entrench the gold gambler in power. While the separate reform forces are fighting among themselves the republican minority will have no difficulty in firmly riveting the chains of industrial slavery upon the limbs of the common people. What a glorious prospect for humanity. What magnificent patriotism. If the platform be all right on the one or more great issues and yet does not embrace every detail of reform which you favor, then denounce your brother reformer as a traitor, spoilsman, an office seeker and stay from the polls or vote a republican ticket outright to give vent to your injured feelings. This programme will make gold standard politicians so happy, say the Vancouver Register.

Seventh. They favor the abolition of trusts.  
Eighth. They are opposed to government by injunction.  
Ninth. They are in favor of arbitration as means of settling disputes between labor and capital.

BROWNELL has missed three of his dates for joint debates with U'Ren. Is he afraid? The steering committee say he is sick, and the election has something to do with it.

AS a matter of principle you cannot refuse to vote the union reform ticket in Clackamas county. If you refuse it puts politics above principle. Vote 'er straight.
