**COUNTY COURT.**

July Term, T. F. Ryan Judge, S. F. Marks and Richard Morton, Commissioners.

Be it remembered that at a regular term of the county court for the state of Oregon, for the county of Clackamas, began and held in Oregon City in said county and state, Monday the 4th day of July, 1898, the same being the first Monday in said month, and the time fixed by law for holding a regular term of said court. Present: Thomas F. Ryan, judge, Elmer Dixon, clerk, and J. J. Cooke, sheriff.

Whereupon a term of said court is begun and held on Wednesday the 6th day of July, 1898, the same being the first Wednesday after the first Monday in said month, and the time fixed by law for the first day of said term of court for the transaction of county business. Present: Hon. Thomas Ryan, judge; S. F. Marks, commissioner; Richard Morton commissioner; Elmer Dixon, clerk; and J. J. Cooke, sheriff.

The court convened according to law and now on this day the following business was led to wit:

In the matter of payment of claims filed against Clackamas county, the court having examined said claims and being fully satisfied; it is ordered by the court that the clerk shall issue warrants on the general fund in favor of the persons and amounts hereinafter specified in payment of said claims:

In the matter of the report of viewers of damages on the Linn road, the same was laid over until the August term.

The petition of Fay Moody for a tax rebate of \$5 95 was denied.

In the matter of redemption of certain lands from tax sale, the petition was granted, and ordered that \$34.15 be received in full of said taxes.

In the matter of the petition for the Shuck's mill road, the same was laid over.

In the matter of county aid for Mrs. Opdycke, \$5 per month granted to begin August 1, 1898, warrants to be drawn in favor of self.

In the matter of re-instating William White on the pauper list, he was granted an allowance of \$8 per month.

In the matter of laying plank on the Highland road, it was ordered that Supervisor Hornschuch lay the same at an expense not to exceed \$125.

F. A. Graining, of Cascade precinct, was granted a liquor license.

In the matter of the purchase of record books, blanks and all necessary supplies for the different offices, the following order was made: Ordered that each officer of the county needing supplies of any description, such as record books, stationery, etc., shall make out the list of same and present it to the court, who shall examine the same, and if found necessary to conduct the office properly he shall purchase the same of such parties and in such places as he finds that the same can be procured to the best advantage of the county.

Ordered that the purchasing agent for the county for the ensuing year shall be Thomas F. Ryan, and he is authorized to contract and purchase all necessary supplies required by the county.

In the matter of the condition of county bridges, all supervisors were ordered to report the conditions of all county bridges in their respective districts at the August term of this court.

The matter of the Boring bridge was referred to Commissioner Morton.

In the matter of the Mount Angel road, an order was made that supervisor Young let the court know why he has not repaired the said road, and the condition of the same.

In the matter of the building of bridges, ordered by the last county court: All bridge work ordered by the last court, which has not been commenced, to be left alone until orders are received from the present court to proceed with the same, unless absolutely unsafe for travel.

In the matter of the Field's bridge, the road supervisor was ordered to repair the approach.

In the matter of the Suspension bridge and court house: said bridge to be repaired and referred to County Judge to consult, and act with city; also to adjust insurance on court house.

In the matter of advertising for bids for wood for court house: clerk ordered to advertise for 50 cords of good sound hard wood.

In the matter of attorneys fees in case of Toedemeir vs county, the same was laid over until next term.

The bonds of J. E. McCoy was approved for bridge contracts.

In the matter of work to be done in road district No 23, it was ordered that \$25 be spent on Canby road to build culvert and repair trestle.

In the matter of the bridge on Kellogg creek, Baker's ferry road, Supervisor Counsell was ordered to build said bridge.

The matter of a franchise for a motor line on the Highland was laid over. One hundred dollars was ordered appropriated for a contingent fund.

Supervisor Tsher was ordered to repair the river road from Stringtown to Neut Critser's place.

The matter of a gravel pit in District No 3, was referred to Commissioner Morton.

In the matter of the appointment of deputy clerk, the same was appointed at a salary of \$80 per month.

In the matter of the rebate of the delinquent taxes on the Clayton estate, G B Dimick requested to look up matters pertaining to the legal assessment of said property.

In the matter of the bond of Elmer Dixon, clerk, the same was approved.

In the matter of the bond of J J Cooke, sheriff, he was granted until next term to file new bond.

In the matter of the bond of Jacob Shade, county Treasurer, bond placed at \$40,000, and granted until August term to make new bond.

In the matter of county aid for James Wyland, he was ordered sent to the Oregon City hospital.

The report of the county clerk showed that \$142.25 had been received in fees for June and said report approved.

In the matter of commissioners mileage and per diem, S F Marks was allowed \$8.60 and Richard Morton, \$8.00.

In the matter of appointment of deputy sheriffs for 1898, J E Jack, regular deputy and C H Isom, special deputy approved.

Road reports continued next week.

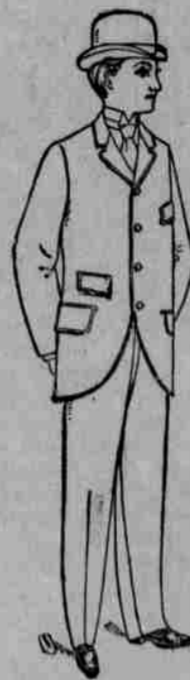
