Matters Concerning Local Everyday Affairs Noticed by the Courier Reporter.

Several from this neighborhood are going. Rus Wileox is at home visiting for a week or two. John T. Irvin and Frank Irvin are working in a sawmill near Gresham. John made a flying trip out home on a wheel last Sunday. Mr. Swan of Portland and Mr. Lentz of Iowa were guests at J. P. Irvin's last Saturday. Mr. Lentz has gone into the mountains to prospect for gold. Good luck to you, Mr. Lentz. George Lockerby sprained his foot last week and is laid up for a few days. We have a good Sunday school and Epworth League at our schoolhouse and a large attendance. Frank Gill is the worthy superintendent of the Sunday school and the president of the league. He is doing a grand work here. Miss Sadie Burnett of Portland is spending the summer with Mrs. Lockerby. We hope she will spend the winter with us. We need her in our league and social circle. Elbert Surface has returned home. He has been working at Pendleton. Our merchant, John Porter, has sold out his stock to John Ely of Carrisville. We will miss the store very much. Our worthy postmaster, J. P. Irvin, is building a large barn. Miss Cretie Lemon came out home for a few days. She is living at Mr. Taber with her grandfather, Dave Deardorf. Gid Kriebaum is building a new dory. He has a fine frame orchard and it is loaded with pines. August 16.

HARVEST NOTES.

Reports From Farmers Concerning Crop Yields, etc.

C. E. Young, of Marquam, went over to Logan Saturday to take charge of J. M. Tracy's new thrasher engine. Mr. Young had just completed threshing his wheat, which yielded 23 bushel to the acre. He expects his oats to yield 56 bushels to the acre. The yield of grain is not coming up to expectations in that neighborhood. John D. Daly, of Macksburg, was in town Saturday, and reports the average yield of wheat in that locality, to be about 15 bushel to the acre. Mr. Daly's fall wheat, however, when threshed, measured 16½ bushel to the acre. W. M. Stone, of Viola, was in the city Saturday, and states that farmers have not yet begun threshing in that neighborhood. On account of the ravages of the bugs and worms, it is not believed that the yield will be up to the usual standard. Deputy County Recorder Ed Dedman reports that crops are short in the vicinity of Clackamas. Wheat is averaging about 15 bushels to the acre, and oats 20. Deputy Sheriff Isom has returned from a trip over the county, and reports the wheat yield short. J. L. Waldron, of New Era precinct, reports that wheat is only yielding about 10 bushel per acre in his immediate neighborhood. Josi Brothers, who live near town, report a yield of 23 bushels to the acre. Postmaster G. A. Schuebel, of Shubel, states that no threshing has yet been done in his immediate neighborhood, but the crop will be short. The Hessian fly and green aphid did considerable damage to the wheat, extracting the juices from the stalk. He states that hops look splendid, and the fruit prospect is good, although apples are falling off the trees to a considerable extent. Lawrence Hornschuch, of Beaver creek, threshed his oats this week, which yielded 39 bushel to the acre. F. R. Andrews, of Maple Shade farm, had his grain threshed this week. His oats yielded 50 bushel to the acre, and his spring wheat from 16 to 18 bushel to the acre. Reports from various sections of the county, indicates a general shortage in the wheat yield due to the ravages of the aphid. However, the yield will not fall far short of other years, a small crop being more apparent than real, as farmers expected an unusual bountiful crop this season. Fruit and hops, in quantity and quality will exceed any former season in Clackamas county.

Game Laws.

In order to satisfy the public and save answering many questions we wish to say that Oregon's game law boiled down is as follows:

Game and fish can be killed only during the following season:

Grouse, Mongolian pheasants and quail, September 1st, to December 1st.

Prairie chickens, July 1st to October 1st.

Wild ducks and water fowl, September 1st to March 15th.

Deer, mountain sheep, etc., August 1st to December 1st.

Killing spotted fawn is prohibited.

Killing for hides or part of part of carcass is prohibited.

Trout may be caught from April 1st to November 1st.

Killing with explosives, and obstructions to free passage of fish, prohibited.

East of the Cascades it is unlawful to kill at any time Mongolian pheasants, quail or Bob White quail.
