PATRONIZE HOME INDUSTRY.

There is some complaint because the city pays for sewers, steps and repair of streets out of the city road fund, when the county roads in city need every dollar that can be spent on them.

The Canby paper claims that some of the Canbys are trying to squeeze it out of existence. While we do not agree with Mr. Gill upon the plan he connects his sheet, we think the people of that enterprising town should do what they conscientiously can for it. A good paper helps a town.

The official canvass in South Dakota shows that the initiative and referendum was carried in that state by over 1,000 majority. And yet the republicans carried the state, showing that more of them must have voted for this measure. The dispensary amendment for the regulation of the liquor traffic also carried.

The Canby Independent asks the COURIER-HERALD to tell him why this country had a good crop under the gold standard. If a ten-year-old school boy would ask such a question there would be an excuse, but when a man with the intelligence of Mr. Gill does, there must be something wrong—under his hat.

How poor it must make your Uncle Collis feel as soon as he crosses the California line into Oregon! Just think of it! The sudden transformation from a seventeen thousand dollar roadbed to a three or four thousand dollar track is enough to make Uncle Collis remember Oregon institutions in his will, and California assessment in his curse.

The treasury of the United States is overflying with borrowed money. Cleveland borrowed \$262,000,000; McKinley borrowed \$200,000,000—making \$462,000,000 borrowed within six years. The republican press point to the large treasury balance as evidence of prosperity. If a nation can borrow itself rich, why cannot an individual do the same? Verily, this is a new doctrine.

The annual meeting of the State Grange held in August passed strong resolutions demanding the re-enactment of the mortgage tax law. The Roseburg Review, the most able fusion paper in the state, prints the latest decisions of the U. S. supreme court holding the mortgage tax law good, and says editorially that it was the best tax law that Oregon has ever had on its statute books.

This government proposes to make silver the basis of the currency in the Philippines; U. S. Railroad Commissioner Longstreet urges the construction of a government air line railroad across the continent; railroad and telegraph lines are to be constructed and operated in Porto Rico by the government. At this rate we will have a demo-pop government before we realize it—unless Marcus Hanna wakes up and saves the country before it is everlasting too late.

This plan mentioned by COURIER-HERALD last week of issuing new six per cent warrants to take up all eight per cent warrants now outstanding is a good one and its adoption would save Clackamas county on its \$140,000 of warrants outstanding two per cent, or \$2,800 per year or \$9,800 for three and one-half years, the average time that the warrant run before being paid. The amount the city would save is about

\$1,000 on its \$17,000 of outstanding warrants which run about three years. Here is a total of about \$11,000 that would be saved to the taxpayers without any effort to speak of. Other counties have done this very thing and we should do likewise. There would be no trouble about disposing of the newly issued warrants at par, and we believe a premium of one or two per cent could be realized.

It is the duty of every American citizen to patronize the newspapers that will defend the rights of the people against the aggression of the money power and the trusts. The money power subscribes a large sum annually to provide "ready prints" and "plate matter" free to country newspapers. The people cannot hope to win their fight so long as they support the press that the enemy is using against them. Give your local paper proper support and thus increase its power for good—Silver Knight Watchman.

Marquam
The following is clipped from the Epworth Herald published for M. E. church at Chicago, and has reference to our county:

"I am a boy twelve years old, and I want to write to the Juniors about lot of things. I am a preacher's boy. This year the big Oregon Conference sent my father to Marquam, on the Hubbard charge. I want to tell you about Marquam. It is not on the railroad; only a stage once a day and a telephone line. But Marquam is a great place.

"This is the first time the preacher has ever lived here, and the new parsonage will not be done until next spring. Now what do you think they did with it? They moved us into a great big farmhouse with eight big rooms, a big barn and 300 acres of land. There are ten acres of fruit trees—fine grapes, apples, pears, and peaches, but we boys don't care for fruit. Carloads of it are lying on the ground rotting. The people are very good to us. One woman brought us a pan full of honey (I guess all boys love honey).

"I don't know what my father is such a great preacher, but he is a hustler. To-day he went out in the country and brought home a cow, a pig, and seven chickens. One of the chickens was a rooster. Bro. Taylor gave him to us. He is a fine fellow—a full-blooded Plymouth Rock. Bro. Taylor had him at the county fair, and he took the prize.

"He is such a good rooster that we call him Bishop Taylor, because Bro. Taylor gave him to us; and because he is a great rooster and Bishop Taylor is a great man.

"Our horse (we call her Miss Ophelia) showed herself off. The first day we came here my father drove her down to the store to get us something to eat, and the mill while she blew a big blast. She got scared and pulled back, and pulled the mill off her head, and went running down the street with the buggy jumping up in the air. About twenty men ran after her. One of them got on a horse, but she kept in the middle of the road and ran about five miles. She did not break the buggy much either.

"I think my father will have a very big congregation, because everybody is talking about how fast his horse can run, and I think they will come to hear him preach."

Death of One of Oregon's Oldest Pioneers.

Died at his home in Clackamas Co., Oregon, 12 miles above Oregon City on the Willamette river, Saturday December 10th, at 8 a. m. John Hancock Zumwalt, aged 81 years and 26 days. John H. Zumwalt was born in Pennsylvania, November 14th, 1817, and moved with his parents to Missouri at an early age, and at the age of 20 was united in marriage to Sarah M. Rowell in Bolivia, Missouri, by the Rev. Mr. Michael, and 13 years later with their little family of four children came to Oregon in an emigrant train, arriving at Oregon City November 15th, 1849, and about one year later they settled on a donation land claim of 640 acres, a part of which he now lives.

To his union were born ten children, the sons are A. Robert and Cap. John D. Zumwalt, of Oregon, the daughters, Mrs. M. C. Graham of Newberg, Mrs. C. S. Riggs of Nestucca, Oregon, Mrs. C. W. Sherrill, now of British Columbia, Mrs. S. J. Epler, of Wilsonville and Mrs. C. O. Davis, of Portland, Oregon. Mrs. Frankie Franklin, Henry and Jackson, having died several years ago. Ten years ago last April Mr. and Mrs. Zumwalt with their children, grandchildren and scores of friends, celebrated their golden wedding at the old home in Clackamas Co. and six years ago the 16th of last March the wife died aged 71 years.

The interment took place Monday the 12th at 2 p. m. at the Pleasant Hill Cemetery, conducted by Rev. A. Brady, of Hoodville, Oregon.
