

NEWS OF THE WEEK

WAR.

Lieutenant Gilmore and party from the gunboat Yorktown have not yet been located.

Bert B. Chandler, company C, and J. E. Taylor, company B, Second Oregon, are dead at Manila from natural causes.

A Spanish prisoner recently released at Manila says the rebels have 50,000 rifles, plenty of ammunition and 200 pieces of artillery.

The Spanish cabinet will authorize Reis to ask Otis' permission to send a force of Spaniards to Baler to secure the Spanish garrison there.

Colonel Stotsenberg, Lieutenant Sisson and two privates of the Nebraska regiment were killed in a battle at Quinara Sunday and 44 men were wounded. The rebels were defeated.

In spite of all denials, it is true that the cabinet and president have discussed secession and treason as shown by the messages and letters sent to the soldiers in the Philippines and intercepted by General Otis.

General Joe Wheeler is ready to leave for Manila.

The wreck of the Spanish torpedo boat destroyer Pluton has been found near Santiago.

As a result of the cabinet meeting Saturday, Secretary Alger will issue an order to permit the shipment of cargoes from Porto Rico to the United States in other than American bottoms.

The administration is considering measures to put a stop to the sending of messages from persons in this country to the troops in the Philippines advising the latter to refuse to do further duty.

FOREIGN.

Signor Moroni, the distinguished London electrician, will visit the United States next November.

The reactionary attitude of the Chinese government toward foreigners at Peking is creating for them an intolerable situation which cannot be prolonged, according to latest Chinese advices.

The Spanish senatorial elections for the new cortes were held Saturday and passed off tranquilly throughout the country. They have resulted in giving the government a larger majority in the senate than it had secured in the chamber of deputies.

M. Cantuzena has formed a cabinet in Rumania to succeed the ministry of Demetrio Strudza, which resigned on April 11. The premier will also take care of the portfolio of the interior. M. Lavovary will take care of the portfolio of foreign affairs.

The city of San Vicente, San Salvador, has been destroyed by earthquakes. No lives were lost.

The Colombian government has met to decide whether or not to extend the present canal concession.

The criminal court of Brunswick, Germany, has sentenced Court Secretary Kooncke to two years' imprisonment on the charge of lese-majeste.

GENERAL.

Ex-Secretary Sherman called on the president Saturday.

Vice President Hobart's condition continues far from satisfactory.

Congressman Cannon has come out as a candidate for speaker of the house.

The town of Clay City, Ky., was destroyed by fire Saturday. Loss, \$40,000.

Four men and a boy were killed by an explosion in a New Mexican coal mine Saturday.

The Missouri river is still rising at Omaha. Many families have been driven from their homes.

A mob of 500 men Friday night tore up a Syracuse street railway track and destroyed much rolling stock because the service was poor.

In Washington the opinion is general that the speakership fight in congress will be between Sherman, of New York, and Hopkins, of Illinois.

An unexpected delay has occurred in the negotiations toward an Alaska boundary modus vivendi, which makes the future of the modus vivendi problematical. Extended conferences were held on the subject Saturday, the result being far from encouraging. The principal difficulty arises from dealing with Ottawa as well as London, this dual negotiation causing great delay and complication.

General Brooke reports typhoid fever abating in Cuba.

National headquarters of the G. A. R. have been opened at Cincinnati.

In a fight between police and riotous negroes at Havana Sunday a bystander was killed.

In a fierce electric storm at Flor de Sagua, Cuba, Sunday, a boy was killed and two girls were injured by lightning.

Sam Hose, a negro murderer, was burned at the stake by a mob of 2000 white people at Newman, Ga., on Sunday.

The executive committee of the National Red Cross dissolved at New York Sunday, its affairs being turned over to the society.

PACIFIC COAST.

Ten thousand cigars were seized at San Francisco Saturday because the stamps on the boxes were found to be fraudulent.

Captain John Dillon, of the United States transport Morgan City, has been found guilty at San Francisco of cruelly beating a sailor on the high seas, and sentenced to pay a fine of \$350.

Heavy storms are reported off the California coast.

Selborne school for boys, located near San Francisco, burned Sunday. Loss, \$30,000.

The revenue cutter Perry will outfit at Seattle, preparatory to going on a long summer cruise.

Fire at Tacoma Sunday damaged a dry kiln and storehouse of the St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber Company to the extent of \$50,000.

STATE.

Yambill county people are enthusiastic over the proposition to have the Oregon volunteers in the Philippines landed at Portland from the transport if they come home by way of the Pacific.

Mrs. Clara Houghton died at her residence in Skipanon Friday afternoon, aged 91 years.

Governor Geer made the final announcement Friday that he would not demand the return of the Oregon volunteers, has been received at the executive office.

The board of regents of the University of Oregon held a meeting at Eugene on Saturday. The matter of selecting a new president for the university was informally discussed.

PRESS CLIPPINGS.

Eugene Journal: A new route has been established between Eugene and Myrtle, on Spencer creek. The contract has been let to one Mr. Ogden, of Washington, and the mail will be carried twice a week.

Dollax Commener: Codd's sawmill started last Monday, and is now turning out lumber at the rate of 40,000 feet per day. There are about 35 hands employed in the establishment at the present time.

Ashland Tidings: Good progress has been made in the work of reorganizing the Ashland band, and it is now practically assured that the city will soon be supplied with a band that has been felt ever since its last famous brass band dissolved.

Ashland Valley Record: The Ashland woolen mill, which has been idle since Feb. 3, was started up again last Monday by Manager George N. Anderson and Foreman J. R. Casey and will be kept in full blast by the crew of about 30 hands.

Medford Mail: The well which is being sunk at the brewery is making good progress, it being 350 feet deep. The work is being pushed, and it is hoped that it may prove to be an artesian well. The substance which is being brought to the surface is principally a thick, leathery blue clay, with some soapstone.

COPPER TRUST.

Mighty Combinations Crushing the Life Blood Out of the Nation.

CHICAGO, April 22.—The Times-Herald will say tomorrow: "Definite information reached Chicago today that the contracts had been signed in London Friday which formally transferred to a single organization practically all of the large producing copper mines in the United States. The details were meager, and came through the brokers who had handled minor parts of the deal in this city.

"It is understood that the mines under contract produce about 425,000,000 pounds fine of the total output of 583,000,000 pounds fine that were mined in this country last year. These mines, it is claimed, will produce fully 475,000,000 pounds fine of the output of 600,000,000 pounds fine estimated for 1899.

"According to estimates made directly after the negotiations for the big producers became public property, the actual value of the mining properties taken over will exceed \$400,000,000. The particulars, however, will probably be made public during the coming week, and the formal life of the company will date from May 1.

"In effect, the new organization is an international trust in copper. The organization will protect the price both in Europe and America and give to the company power to distribute the output intelligently and economically to the markets where it is most in demand. It was the latter consideration which brought into the combination some of the interests which were previously antagonistic. The Rothschilds furnished the funds and made the stipulations for the European interests involved, while the Standard Oil Company was credited with acting in the same capacity for the American side. The Rothschild interest had its main leverage in its holdings on Isle Royal, in Lake Superior, known as the Wendigo Copper Company, the stock of which concern is not listed on any American exchange, and the Isle Royal Land Company, Limited. Among the other properties named in yesterday's private cables were the Clark-Bigelow and the Marcus Daly interests in Montana, the Arcadian and Centennial, in the Lake Superior region, and the Old Dominion, in Arizona, but it is known that several other companies not named are included."

Safe and Lock Combine.

CLEVELAND, April 22.—The safe and lock manufacturers of the United States are about to form a combination, and it is said the agreement will be completed within 30 days. There will be 13 companies in the organization. The capital stock will be \$17,500,000, of which \$2,500,000 will be common stock.

The constituent companies will be the Herring, Hall, Marvin Company, of New York; the Remington-Sherman Company, of New York; the Damon Safe and Lock Company, of Boston; the York Safe and Lock Company, of York, Pa.; the Barnes Safe and Lock Company, of Pittsburg; the Mosler Safe and Lock Company; McNeal & Urban; the Hall Safe and Lock Company and the Cincinnati Safe and Lock Company, of Cincinnati; the Carey Safe and Lock Company, of Buffalo; the Detroit Safe and Lock Company, of Detroit; the Diebold Safe and Lock Company, of Canton, and the National Safe and Lock Company, of Cleveland.

The object of the combination will be, a representative of a local company says, to reduce the cost of manufacture and promote the sale of safes, and not to advance prices.

Steel and Chain Trust.

DOVER, Del., April 22.—A certificate of incorporation of the Union Steel and Chain Company, with a capital stock of \$60,000,000, the largest incorporation that has yet come into existence under the new state laws, was filed tonight with Secretary of State Hughes. One-half the capital stock is preferred and one-half common. The stock, it is said, will be listed, with options on all chain plants and steel works throughout the country. Through the Corporation Trust Company, under whose counsel it sought life, there was paid into the treasury of Delaware \$1500 fee, \$90000 state tax, and the company will continue to pay about \$3650 annually. The incorporators are W. F. Kaney, E. L. Harper and Maurice E. Doran, all of New York.
