

### NEWS OF THE WEEK

#### STATE.

Asbland had a small fire Sunday. Baker City's depot narrowly escaped destruction by fire Sunday night. An unknown assailant severely beat Mrs. Mary Welsh with a club, at Ontario. Spiritualist campmeeting at New Era begins July 8. Ontario cattle shipments in the last month amounted to \$1,500,000. A case involving \$2,500 is being heard by the supreme court. A grain elevator with a capacity of 100,000 bushels is being built at \$800,000. Mayor Beck, of Elgin, has returned from an extended eastern trip. Benjamin Cleland has been elected chief engineer of Albany fire department. But trees in the orchard of Oliver Paton in Asbland yielded six gallons of peaches. Cakebaker trades people have difficulty in making change owing to a scarcity of nickels and dimes. Miss Amy North has been elected goddess of beauty at Asbland, receiving 14,317 of the 25,421 votes cast. It is reported in Canyon City that the Southern Railway Company has bought 100 acres of land near John Day for a tourist camp. A fire broke out near St. Paul. The Oregon Legion started on the Yamhill river boats. A theatrical company will take place August 21, 22, and 23. Small boy at Corvallis missed the capture, and shot Mrs. A. Campbell.

#### PACIFIC COAST.

Bonney, Wash., is talking of organizing a mining exchange. There are several cases of smallpox at Auburn, Lincoln county, Wash. The government is arranging for the construction of a Yachting barracks. The revenue substations of Tacoma are to be opened for business Saturday. Grasshoppers are becoming numerous and destroying crops in eastern Wash. The butchers and the grocers of Spokane have formed a union and will stop selling prices. San Francisco will be well represented at the coming Philadelphia exposition. Viola McFall arrested for attempting to bribe a Seattle policeman. A genuine infernal machine was found near Goldendale, Wash. Senator Fairbanks' party were entertained at Skagway. Another fire at Dixon destroyed 60 miners' cabins.

#### GENERAL.

A \$150,000 fire at Summit, N. J. Democratic national committee will meet in Chicago, July 29. Secretary of Agriculture Wilson is on his way west. A mutiny on the cruiser Panther, now at League Island navy yard. A Philadelphia street-car collision killed two people; and two killed in a similar manner at Pittsburg. Governor Pingree denies that he is hostile to McKinley. Hearings of teachers are on their way to Los Angeles. Chicago packing-house employees will strike until September. No further disturbances between union and non-union men at Cartersville. Kansas, Ill., is now free from negroes. Message asking for troops in Clay county, Ky., is said to have been forged. Damage from floods in Texas is estimated at \$2,000,000. General Miles highly compliments the Oregon volunteers. Best year for shipbuilding, excepting 1891, in a quarter of a century. Oregon volunteers are expected to reach San Francisco on July 14. H. G. Otis conferred with President McKinley in Washington. General Miles is the guest of John Sherman at Mansfield, Ohio. Number of drownings in Texas floods is placed at 65. Santiago day was elaborately celebrated at many places. Buffalo socialists criticize the government. Eight women hurt in a Chicago factory fire. Strikers enjoined from interfering with company property at Cartersville, Ill. Frank Erne defeated Dick Lavigne in a contest for lightweight pugilistic championship, Tuesday. General Merriam, in command of the troops at Wardner, insists that he is a friend to labor.

#### FOREIGN.

Belgian socialists are opposed to electoral reform. Dreyfus is guarded like a wild beast, yet his composure is a wonder to all. Many people were injured in a railway wreck in London. Rioters attempted to burn a Jesuit college at Valencia, Spain. Dreyfus is confident that the second court-martial will acquit him. A Cuban general is said to be trying to organize a monarchy. Santiago has 74 cases of yellow-fever. North German Lloyd Steamship Co., has ordered three new passenger boats. President Schurman of the Philippine commission has returned from his cruise among the southern islands. He says that peace in the Philippines would follow a decisive victory in Luzon. Transvaal volksraad is giving in. Peace treaty is finally ratified by the Spanish senate. Great Britain talks of buying Niger company's territory in Africa. Malleotans and Matanfan chiefs in Samoa shook hands and promised to be good.

#### How Much Are Votes Worth?

LONDON, July 3.—Senator Hanna is attracting much attention in the London papers. The "American king maker" is what the Daily Chronicle styles him. In regard to presidential prospects, the senator said: "If you wait a year I shall, perhaps, be able to tell you who will be the next president. That is about all most anybody could say. But as to Admiral Dewey, why I do not suppose he is likely to walk on the carpet." The papers publish with all seriousness a story of Senator Hanna's visit to the House of Commons, Tuesday. He was taken to the House by Mr. Henry White, secretary of the United States embassy, and after listening to the open speeches of the debate, the senator is reported to have said: "How much will a vote on this bill be worth?" The St. James Gazette impudently comments on this version of the senator's visit, saying he was "inurely applying the standard of Washington to Westminster," adding "It will be understood by those familiar with the scandals of congress, that he put the question quite seriously."
