

City Council.

There was a walk-out at the city council meeting Wednesday night, all on account of the water commissioner matter.

Mayor Latourette was absent, and President Koerner sat in the chair. After the routine business was completed, President Koerner called Councilman Busch to the chair and read a certificate from County Recorder Randall reciting that he had examined the index and was unable to find a record of any property owned by R. D. Wilson, the newly elected water commissioner. Mr. Koerner then moved that the council proceed to elect a water commissioner. Schuebel made a motion to adjourn; then wanted to postpone the matter. Finally it transpired that Koerner's side of the house was in the majority by one. Metzner said he had to go out to see a military man, and Schuebel suddenly remembered that he had left a horse standing outside, and was followed outside by Dr. Powell. The remaining members of the council then adjourned,

as there was no quorum to do business. At this meeting the ordinance providing that heavy wagons use broad tires was read the first time and ordered published. The water commission presented their semi-annual report, which contained some interesting information. Extracts from it will be printed next week. The treasurer's quarterly report showed a balance in the general fund of \$3092. The recorder's report showed that three burial permits had been issued during June.
