

well known in Oregon City and where we helped uphold the old eagle's weary pinions.

On The Trail.

A trip across the W. V. & C. M. W. road better known as the Lebanon route, is a jaunt long to be remembered. One leaves the last settlement coming 21 75 west at Sisters postofice, a drive over a 15 00 smooth good track mostly down a gentle incline brought us to the toll gate 12 00 pitality that cheers the weary travelers.

Only two or three wagons had crossed 6 00 the mountains at that time (July 1)_ 7 50 westward and here we met John Todd 6 00 a pioneer cattle king of Cook county, en route home from Stayton, having Total \$437 30 brought 42 head of Hereford cattle through the snow. Mr. T. says that in price received for cattle was \$80.00 per head for four year old steers and the 50 cheapest purchased by him was 285 head of mixed cattle from yearlings to four year old steers and cows at \$9.50 ren en route from Pe. dleton to Eugene children of Crook county, en route to Sweet Home, were camped here and we went into executive meeting of the ways and means committee to canvass the probability of getting through the snow, a unanimous resolution was passed to make the start at four o'clock next morning, a climb of four miles brought us to the snow line. We found the first three miles from one to six feet deep but hard and firm and our horses scarcely left a foot print or our wagons a track on its 50 white bosoms, the rays of the morning sun soon softened it through and the 5 00 horses begin to sink deeper in the snow 6 75 with every rod traversed. At length Mr. 6 00 Miller's wagon sank to the bed in the snow we had to double up our horse

After eight miles of snow (and I am certain if James W. Watson had ever previously wallowed through that last four miles he would never have written 12 6) his famous poem "Beautiful (?) Snow"). We came to the summit of Sand mountain and there was no more snow down to Fish Lake Station four miles, but we had to cross a swift mountain stream in the lava beds that came up over our buggy bed, ran over the dash board and nearly swamped us. It looked like bad 3 00 medicine to take. Ahead was the roaring river, behind was the walls of snow.

We arrived at Fish Lake, a famous summer resort where fish abound galore. We sampled these lake trout and pronounced them fit for an epicure. Mr. Miller's team was worn out so he stopped nere for a day or two to recuperate while Mr. Noble, a veteran mountaineer and your reporter in company with R. D. Wright hit the trail. There is two summits on the W. V. & C. M. W. rat between Lost prairie and the Western summit. We had three miles of rotten snow that was very difficult, around the pine trees the snow had melted away Patent leaving a perpendicular circular wall of snow often ten feet deep, every moment & sel'4 of nwl4 sec 18, 4 s, 4 e; Patent we expected our equine friends to drop out of sight. As we tolled through the snow a faint blue fringe of smoke greeted our vision and as we emerged from the green forest into vast belt of dead timber we ran up against a typical mountain fire on a south hill side, the road here was graded and a fierce wind caused the hungry flames to leap clear across our roadway, fragments of burning bark were dropping all around us. 1 The committee on highways and byways then went into special session and decided that discreation was the better part of valor so we executed a flank movement and beat a retreat.

Later in the evening the wind died down and after throughly saturating our clothing and throwing wet robes over our horses we made a rush for the west through fire and smoke, in a swift gallop we dashed safely through and soon bade adieu to snow drifts at the summit of Seven Mile Hill down which we gaily flew with smoking brakes. At the foot of the mountain and sixteen miles from Fish lake arose the vine clad rustic walls of the renowned "Mountain House" presided over by Mr. and Mrs. Kelso, ideal host and hostess. Four miles futher down the Santiam

we came to Upper Soda springs and Garrison P. O. People from all over the Willamette valley and the sage 600 brush empire flock here to spend the sultry summer weeks of dog days. It would be hard to find a more desirable haven, for here is that lodge in a vast wilderness that boundless continuity of shade where rumors of oppression and deceit of successful or unsuccessful wars might never reach us more, and best news of all to the sportive minded waters of the Santiam fairly sparkle with the abundance of that prince of the finny tribe, the mountain trout.

Twenty-seven miles more brings us to Sweet House where we met a number of Ex-Oregon City citizens amongst whom we can mention Mr. and Mrs. H. Green, Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Rands well known in Oregon City and where
