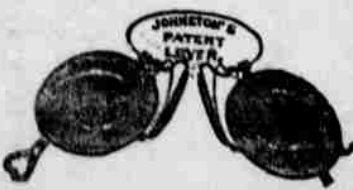

EDUCATIONAL.

Notes Pertaining to School Matters.

TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

The Clackamas County Teachers' Association held a profitable meeting at Springwater last Saturday, notwithstanding it was one o'clock in the afternoon when County Superintendent N. W. Bowland and the Oregon City delegation reached there. They were delayed in getting the crowd together, and it was a long drive out there over the slippery roads. As a result, considerable of the program was omitted. The Springwater people entertained the visiting teachers royally, gave them a splendid dinner, and insisted on them remaining over night, and returning home on Sunday.

Professor T. J. Gary presented "Our Course of Study, How to Make it Effective," and the discussion that followed, was participated in by Zinser, Bowland, Gintner and Moore. A committee of seven was appointed to divide the course of study into months for the convenience of the younger teachers in Clackamas county.

H. M. Stalnaker, principal of the Clackamas school, presented "Composition" in a very interesting, practical way. Some discussion of the subject followed.

L. L. Moore, principal of the Milwaukie school, presented "The Value of Professional Reading to Teachers." He handled the subject in a practical way, showing the advantages to be derived from well selected reading matter of this kind.

Miss Fannie G. Porter did not give the result of her experiences at the last meeting of the National Teachers' Association, on account of the limited time, but will present the subject at some future meeting of the association.

No place was chosen to hold the next meeting, but the association is open to invitations, and an acceptance will be made in time for arrangements for the October meeting.

Stalnaker, of Clackamas; Ara and Ada McLaughlin, Milwaukie; Robert Gintner, Beaver creek; Misses Mayfield and Iva Harrington, Highland; T. J. Gary, J. C. Zinser, Miss Fannie G. Porter and Miss D. Lyle Lawrence, Oregon City; Misses Messick and Smith, Portland. Miss Lewellen, of Springwater, was elected a member of the association. Springwater has an excellent school, the teachers being Misses Iva Harrington and Ada McLaughlin. The board of directors are W. T. Smith, J. A. Shibley and W. H. Kandle, and the clerk is John Stormer.

Fred Meindl commenced the fall term of the Holcomb school Monday.

Miss Hattie Wilcox began the fall term of school at Liberal Monday.

O. H. Byland commenced school at Maple Lane Monday.

Miss Minnie Wintermantle, of Canby, began teaching at Anrora Monday.

The fall term of the Canby school began last Monday, with 120 pupils enrolled. Shirley Beck is principal, and Miss Josephine Fullerton, teacher of the primary department.

Miss Agnes Matlock is teaching the Mulino school.

New Pastor at the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Rev. R. A. Atkins and family, recently of Hillsboro, have taken up their residence in the Methodist Episcopal parsonage here. The Hillsboro Argus gives them the following complimentary notice: Rev. R. A. Atkins, who leaves the Hillsboro M. E. pastorate to take charge of the Oregon City field, has been occupying the pulpit in this city for two years. 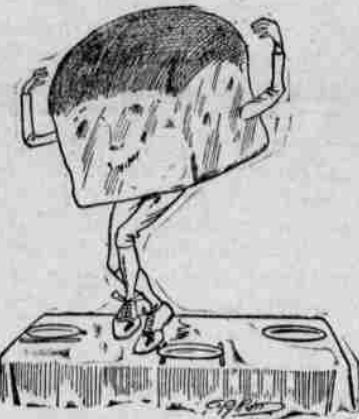
