The molten fires vast forests felled; Clouds of smoke were rising there; Within the homes where Wascos dwelled Sulphurous odors filled the air.

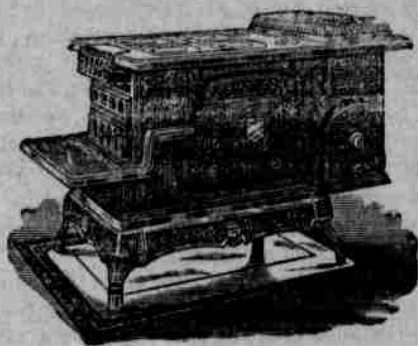
The lurid light of crater's flames Caused half the stars to pale away, Nor morning's sun with brighter beam Could scarce give sign of coming day.
