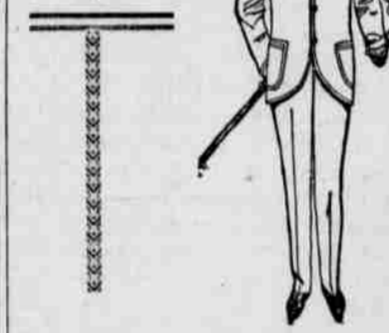

NEWS OF THE WEEK

OREGON. Albert Waddle was seriously wounded in a stabbing affray at Sweet Home. J. P. Hahn was the offender. Dayton has a new paper. There is a great scarcity of Chinese pheasants this year. Grapes were greatly injured by frosts in the vicinity of Stayton. Yaquina jetty was badly injured by a tempest. The chitten bark fraud men are out on bail at Monroe. Rain interfered with the running of the La Grande sugar factory. All farm work was stopped by rain in the vicinity of Junction City. Oats in the field are a total loss. Seventeen insurance companies in the state are said to be liable to have their licenses revoked because of violation of the law.

PACIFIC COAST. The transport Senator, with Iowa troops, is in port at San Francisco. Governor Steenbergh, of Idaho, refused requisition papers for a forger because the state was too poor to bring back criminals. Women of the W. C. T. U. occupied the pulpits of the Seattle churches Sunday. An unidentified body was found at Long Beach, Wash. Indications are found which support the theory that the Pelican foundered off the Aleutian islands. The United States commissioner at San Francisco holds that Chinese immigrants must show what their business was in this country and where conducted. Thurston county, Washington, will grow cranberries on a large scale. Another party of surveyors are working on a railroad line down the Columbia on the Washington side. President Mellen and other Northern Pacific officials coming west. W. O. T. U. convention at Seattle passed resolutions censuring high government officials. Coeur d'Alene rioters' trials will begin next week. Supreme court upheld the San Francisco charter. Washington growers will hold their hops for a better price. Mrs. Nettie Craven scores a small victory in her contest of the Fair will at Frisco.

GENERAL. Nine men are known to have perished in the recent Montana blizzard. Rear-end collision on Oregon Short Line near Farmington, Utah. Freight trains; no details. Sir Thomas Lipton will again challenge for the American yacht cup. Probably in 1901. It is said that Archbishop Chapelle will represent the United States in the Philippines in a diplomatic capacity. Major-General Miles is accompanied by his family and a few friends on his trip west. It is reported that Harrington-Gould-Vanderbilt interests may consolidate. William H. Brown rode 1000 miles a wheel in 84 hours, breaking the record by several hours. Fitzsimmons will fight Jeff Thorne, a South African celebrity, in Chicago tomorrow. There was a fatal prize fight in Chicago. William Wilke was killed by Charles Chelius. Soldiers who made trouble at San Carlos Indian agency, Arizona, are to be punished. A monument to Parnell, the Irish leader, will be erected in New York. Eveleth, Minn., is to be moved to make room for mining operations on the town site. War between Mexicans and Americans at El Paso, Tex., in which four Mexicans and one American were killed. Robbers at Atchison, Kan., looted a store and killed two men, wounding several others. Northern Pacific stockholders held a meeting in New York Saturday. The American Federation of Labor will meet in Detroit, Mich., the next time. The National W. C. T. U. is in a flourishing condition. Jimmy Ryan was knocked out by Joe Choyinski in New York. Steve O'Donnell put Jake Kilrain to sleep at Baltimore in five rounds. The recall of General Otis may be brought about by the republicans of Ohio. General Miles will visit Portland to look into facilities for handling government transportation business. Sir Thomas Lipton says the best boat won. He expects to challenge again. He will visit Chicago next week. Discharged employes who knocked down fares are said to be largely respon-

sible for the threatened strike on the Great Northern. The seriousness of the situation is acknowledged. Possibility of a strike on the Great Northern is now believed to be more remote. New yellow fever cases at Key West and New Orleans. Excommunicated parish of Catholics in East St. Louis were restored to membership by an order from Rome. Big advance in furs in Chicago. Sir Thomas Lipton wined and dined in New York. Jim Jeffords was knocked out in the fifth round by Gus Ruhlin in New York. Proposed canal routes discussed at commercial congress. Torpedo-boat Dalgren made 31 knots Tuesday, exceeding contract requirement. Two more assassinations as a result of the great Kentucky feud. General Miles is in Omaha. Nebraska is having a remarkably hot spell. Bryan has begun a two weeks' tour of his own state. Lead and zinc trust formed to control Missouri mines. Eight new cases of yellow fever at Jackson, Miss. Total of 18 cases. United States army officers sent to South Africa to watch the army operations. Clash between Rear-Admiral Watson and Commander Taussig, of the Benington, is fixed up.

FOREIGN. Revolution in Columbia is spreading. Another battle is on at Dumlee. Peace is now expected to come soon in the Transvaal. Major Guy Howard was killed in a Philippine battle last Saturday. People at Vryburg are panic-stricken. Forty-three Boers killed at Mafeking. Three Filipino officers entered Angeles and asked permission to call on General Otis to arrange for delivery of American prisoners. The British parliament has voted £10,000,000 war credit. Another Filipino delegation is arranging to visit Washington. Military science is said to have been the winning factor in the Glencoe battle Saturday last. Andrade has not resigned the presidency of Venezuela, but has fled toward La Guayra with 800 men. The Boers suffered reverse at Spruitfontein Sunday. Vryburg surrendered to the Boers and the inhabitants fled. Three hundred wounded burghers have arrived at Johannesburg. It is rumored that 1580 Boers were killed by mine explosions at Mafeking. New South Wales will send a contingent of troops to the Transvaal. The Transvaal war is expected to help United States trade in South Africa. Famine reported in Buchananland. A Spanish minister resigned Tuesday. General Cronje is reported captured at Mafeking. Reported from several sources that Kruger will surrender. Prince of Wales received ex-President Harrison Monday. Mrs. Stockwell, of New York, robbed of \$75,000 at Savoy hotel, London. Cecil Rhodes has asked for reinforcements to be sent to Kimberly. Capture of General Filjoen by the British pleases Ulanders greatly. England will expect Boers to pay the cost of war when the end comes. Otis refused to meet the Filipino alleged peace commission unless it was properly accredited by Aguinaldo. General Ezeta is said to be losing no time in Mexico in completing his plans for the San Salvador revolution. Venezuelan government has formed a new cabinet. British have abandoned Dundee and Glencoe and will concentrate at Ladysmith. Boers advancing outnumber British three to one. Cronje's force, repulsed at Mafeking, is now advancing on Kimberley. Attorney Lewis, representing Atlin miners in their claims against Canada, has succeeded in making a fool of himself in England.

STATE. Medford will have a new depot. Two tramps arrested at Eugene for assaulting Hiram Shook at Constock. J. A. Willard shot and killed Ted Perry in a controversy near Salem. School officers convention will be held at Corvallis Saturday. Oregon sorghum samples tested at agricultural college and found to be very rich. Safe opened \$300 worth at Astoria Transfer Company stables. Astoria fishermen now pronounce the fall season a failure. Government work on the Long Tom river has ceased on account of high water.
