City Council Meeting

Very little was done at the city council meeting, except the appointment of judges and clerks of election. All the councilmen were present except Koerner and Min. The recorder's report showed that two burial permits had been issued during the month of October. Robert Gardner had been sentenced to 25 days on the streets; and Sol Clark had been sentenced to work on the streets in certain amounts, the usual sentences. Liquor licenses had been received to the amount of \$400, and a solicitor's license to the amount of \$2 was allowed. The street committee was authorized to build a new sidewalk on the Mount Pleasant road, the property owners to stand half the expenses. An order was also made authorizing the street committee to make a disposition of the culvert problem. An order was made authorizing the committee to make a call for the city election on the 4th day of November, defining polling places. The following judges and clerks of election were appointed: First ward—judges, M. E. Willoughby, J. A. Stuart and Ed Reckner; clerks, N. M. Moody and J. W. Boatman. Second ward—judges, C. C. Babcock, S. Walker, and E. E. Howell; clerks, J. A. Rhoades and F. W. Greenman.

Third ward—Judges, J. N. Harrington, George Ely and L. Stipp; clerks, D. G. Frost and R. G. Pierce.

Teachers' Association.

The October meeting of the Association was held at Oswego, Saturday, Oct. 28, 1899. Meeting was called to order at 11 a. m., Supt. B. Wland in the chair. Association opened with a song by the pupils of Oswego school. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

Prof. Parker, of California, delivered an interesting and instructive talk on "The Life of Froebel."

Mrs. Evans spoke on the subject of "Public Libraries."

A vote of thanks was tendered to the people of Oswego, and to Profs. Burnham, Parker and Wilson for the entertainment given.

On motion the Association adjourned to meet at West Oregon City on the last Saturday in November.
