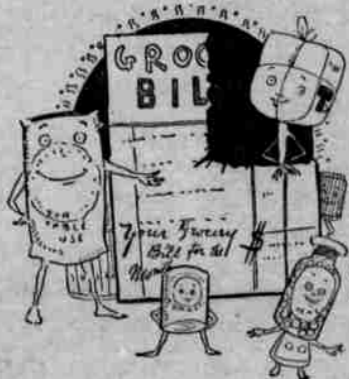

Regular April Term in Now in Session.

The regular April term of circuit court convened Monday morning. T. W. Fouts and T. M. Miller are the court bailiffs, and the other officers the same as at previous terms.

The following proceedings were had on the first day: W. B. Ames vs Lizzie N. Bowers; stricken from the docket.

Mary A. Lazelle vs G. R. H. Miller, et al; motion for a new trial. S. Klinger vs George Saum; findings for defendant.

Jemima Kirk vs Louis Rath, et al; settled and dismissed. Jacob Selweizer vs Jacob S. Miller; set for trial next Monday.

Henry Thiesen vs T. R. Worthington; findings for plaintiff. This suit has been in court for a number of years, the object being to determine the ownership of a small strip of land in Milwaukee precinct.

Rebecca Long vs J. W. Doores; this cause was heard upon defendant's motion for dissolution of the restraining order heretofore made, it is ordered that said order be and is hereby vacated.

Hill Sewer System

Our friend, W. C., is again at the council with a petition for sewers. For years he has been pushing for this and a sewer is no doubt badly needed in his neighborhood, and his argument that all who have to use the sewer in the future, should help pay for it, is quite fair; but the people are capable of judging as to the amount they can afford to pay or that they ought to pay.

Seventh street, the crest of the hill, was made a base line for the low alley lines on each side. Center street was to have a base line of pipes from 11 feet to 14 feet deep, through a bed of solid rock that would probably cost about \$3 per lineal foot for excavations, alone.

The unsightly mounds of rock, so hard to get rid of, would disappear, half the street would have to be blasted out to get the required depth, and they could insist on having an even surface of crushed rock left at the finish.

A system of pipes running from the foot of the hill along the natural waterway towards Jackson street would serve all present requirements on the south of Seventh street, North Seventh street requiring a different arrangement. Probably a line of pipes along the alley ways between Seventh and Eighth could be connected at the foot of Seventh street.

By following the contour of the natural drainage much shallower excavations would be required, saving much cost in making future connection repairs. Then all blocks should be drained as far as possible through the alleys, thus giving shorter range for connections, allowing for smaller connecting pipes without choking, and also preventing the constant cutting up of the main thoroughfares.

A main pipe as far as Jefferson street is probably all that is immediately required. This, if carried out economically, should entail but little expense on the rate payers who may need the future use it.

Some plan of this sort, the expense of which must be definitely known and strictly moderate, especially to those not receiving immediate benefit, would probably receive no opposition from the majority of property holders, but anything like the present scheme will certainly raise a hornet's nest.
