Attention Water Consumers!

Rate for sprinkling or irrigation, in addition to household or other use, is \$1.00 for the season of 1901, PAYABLE JUNE 1ST. This includes use of hose during the year. Rate where the water is not used for other purposes shall be \$2.00 per month or \$5.00 for the season—from May 1st to October 1st, payable in advance. Hours for sprinkling or irrigation are from 5 to 9 o'clock morning and evening only. No consumer will be permitted to sprinkle or irrigate the premises of another, unless the regular charge has been paid. An excessive use of water will not be permitted. For a disregard of rules and regulations governing in the use of water the service may be shut off without further notice.

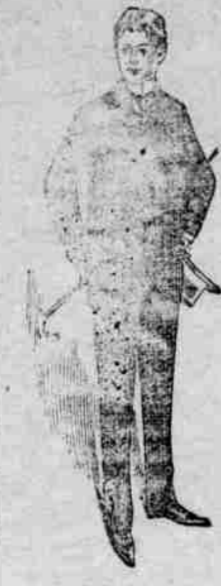
