



WHEN AND HOW TO PRUNE. In Winter For Wood Growth, Ia


Summer For Fruit Production. There are many orchards well cared for in every way except in the matter of pruning, and this is often sadly neglected or improperly done, some claiming that it is working against nature to prune. If we neglect it, nature makes an effort to do it for us in her only way-by causing the surplus wood to die for want of air and sunlight, This is an objectionable way of pruning, as it leaves only dead scars on our trees for life. The true principle of pruning is to begin with the young maiden tree and give it light annual pruning when it can all be done with the pruning shears. If this is then neglected and a tree allowed to grow as it will, we will have hard work to get it in proper shape and will injure the tree more or less by cutting away large branches. Trees will form a very nice looking head when young with but little pruning, but before we are aware of it we have a tree so dense that the inside wood begins to die, and it is impossible for the fruit to come to perfection.

This matter of pruning is neglected and improperly done more than anything else pertaining to fruit culture. Every kind of fruit and in fact nearly every variety of the same kind needs a different method of pruning. Clapp's Favorite pear might do fairly well with an occasional heading in, as it makes but little surplus wood, but the same treatment applied to many other varieties that make a surplus of wood, such as the Lawrence and many heap.

Why Bees Work In Darkness.

Summer pruning Why do they prefer to work in the dark? is often asked. Every one knows that honey is a liquid with no solid Lamb. sugar in it. After standing it gradually assumes a crystalline appearance or granulates and ultimately becomes a solid mass.

Honey has been experimentally inclosed in well corked flasks, some of which were kept in perfect darkness, while the others were exposed to the light. The result was that the portion to exposed to the light soon crystallized, while that kept in the dark remained unchanged.

Hence we see why the bees are so careful to obscure the glass windows which are placed in their hives.
