In the matter of the petition of Addie P. Barlow for settlement of taxes. This matter now coming on to be heard on petition of Addie P. Barlow showing to the board that she is the owner of lot 2, block 3, in Barlows, Clackamas county, Oregon. 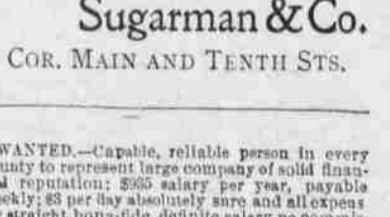
