SCHOCL NOTES.

The Oswego school, which graduated more eighth grade pupils last year than any other school in Clackamas county—that is pupils that actually passed the rigid county examination, now has an enrollment of 420 students, and more coming. The teachers are Professor H. T. Evane, principal; Misses Georg-iana Bell and Pearl Nida, primary teachers, and Miss Maggie Guttridge, teacher of the intermediate department.

The public schools of this city opened last Monday with an attendance of 54 pupils, 27 in each room, which number will be largely increased in a short time. Therew course of study was put in use and a lively scramble eusued during the first day to get the proper books and the pupils in the proper classes. The school in charge of Mrs. Collins, formerly Miss Gertrude Finley, and Miss George, will undoubtedly be a success.—St. Helens


