The individual poducer is at the tender (?) mercies of commission sharks and diamond stud speculators.

One reason why Hood river bruit al-ways commands good prices is that they have a well organized union and no competition amongst the produces.

Henry T. Williams, who owns extensive celerids in the Ozara mountains of

Arkansas, and who recently purchased an Source orchard in Hood River valley, rays, in speaking of the strawberry industry here: "The demand exceeded the supply. Markets that wanted them could not be supplied, and had to gowithout. Commission men who wanted them on commission were told that nothing left this place except when paid for in advance or guaranteed. Dealers who want to beat down prices were told. that if they were not good to stick by prices first given they would not get any. Never befor was the grower King of the market. But one variety can be sold with favor and from but one place. the true home of its adoption-Hood River. There are certain peculiar merits connected with this variety—The Clark's Seedling, That it constitutes a chapter in he accuse very remarkable What that gives this berry its excellence of a norm knows. Several shipments of strawberries that went to the Klondyke country are reported to have arrived there in condition and sold like hot alces at \$5 per bex.
