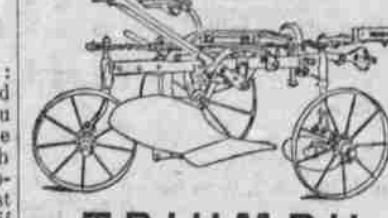

Tuesday, November 19.

For The new Hay-Pauncote
Nicaraguan note treaty was signed
today at 12:05 by Secre-
tary Hay, for the United
States, and Lord Pauncote, the British
Ambassador, for Great Britain. This
treaty is intended to replace the first
Hay-Pauncote treaty. That conven-
tion was amended so extensively by
the United States senate at the last
session that the British government de-
clined to ratify it. Within a few weeks
negotiations began afresh between Sec-
retary Hay and Lord Pauncote, which
have just resulted in the signature of the
new treaty, drawn with special refer-
ence to the objections with the first
treaty. From a due sense of the court-
ney which must be observed towards
the United States senate wherever a
treaty is concerned, the state depart-
ment is stepped from making public the
text of the new convention, and that will
remain secret until the senate itself shall
break the seal of confidence.

Twenty-seven canvassing committees
appointed at Portland to raise money for
the Lewis & Clark exposition.

The following paragraph is taken from

former paragraph. For the good of the
organization the same is herewith re-
produced lest the prediction be denied
by the all-wise, the same is reprinted to
put at rest the troubled minds of the in-
dividuals ever striving to overthrow
Gibbon Post, to-wit:

REPUTING A LIE.

The present condition of John Gibbon
Post, No. 78, is due to the dastardly con-
duct of certain self-constituted lights
of Meade Post, No. 2, through that, by
false and misrepresentations and with-
out notice, whatever, succeeded to annul
the charter of Gibbon Post. This, how-
ever, is only temporary and of short
duration, as the near future will prove.
