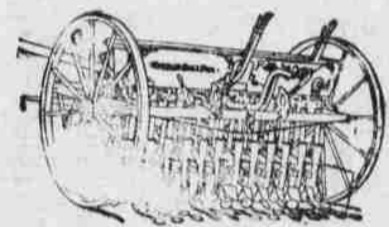

Lieu Land Scrip. The railroad holdings in forest reserves, sometimes called scrip, although the authorities here in Washington, say it cannot be so designated, as exchanges for these holdings must be by deed of conveyance—stand in the way of successful administration of the forest reserves.

Edgar Stanton Maceley, whose connection with the Schley case led President Roosevelt to request his resignation as special laborer in the navy, made formal demand today for trial by the usual navy proceeding.

Ex-Governor Shaw, of Iowa, has been offered the secretaryship of the treasury.

Kitchener reports sharp fighting in Orange River and Transvaal colonies. British losses in Transvaal engagements were heavy.

Murderers Wade and Dalton, the Morrow murderers, are sentenced to hang in Portland on January 31st.

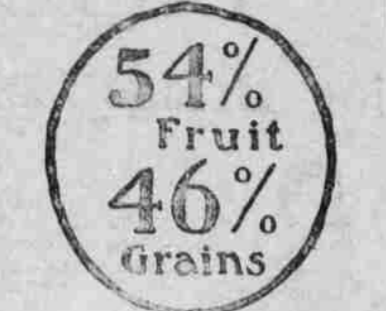

Manila Peculiarities.

A capable newspaper correspondent, who has lived in Manila, writes from that city, in an illustrated article published in The Outlook, that acquaintance with Manila lessens objections to it. "It grows on one like vice or an acquired taste. The few natives whom whites meet in business or socially are courteous, quiet, likable people, even if whites never feel sure about trusting them. Native habits are not offensive. Everybody smiles and fights chickens, but both of these pastimes seek reasonable seclusion. There is no intemperance. Cafes and saloons do not intrude their smells and noises on all sides, as in Havana. An American wonders at the few drinking-places until he learns that they cater only to his own kind, who constitute about three per cent of Manila's population, and not more than four per cent when soldiers flock to town. Natives keep to themselves. They do not gather in street crowds, except for church processions in fiestas celebrated in daylight. After dark they prefer the quiet of their own homes, where friends may drop in and enjoy a nibble of sweets and music.

"Soil sun and bounteous rains make amends for human neglect by garments of waving green, rich with blossoms, which they spread profusely about the yards and houses. There are lovely pictures almost everywhere. When Manila shall learn modern ways, and become prosperous enough to induce the public improvements which it needs and to popularize fresh paint and tidy habits among householders, it may be no longer mockery to call it Pearl of the Orient."
