THE Prosperity, of which we have heard so much lately, has one very serious charge to answer. That is the increase in the employment of child labor.

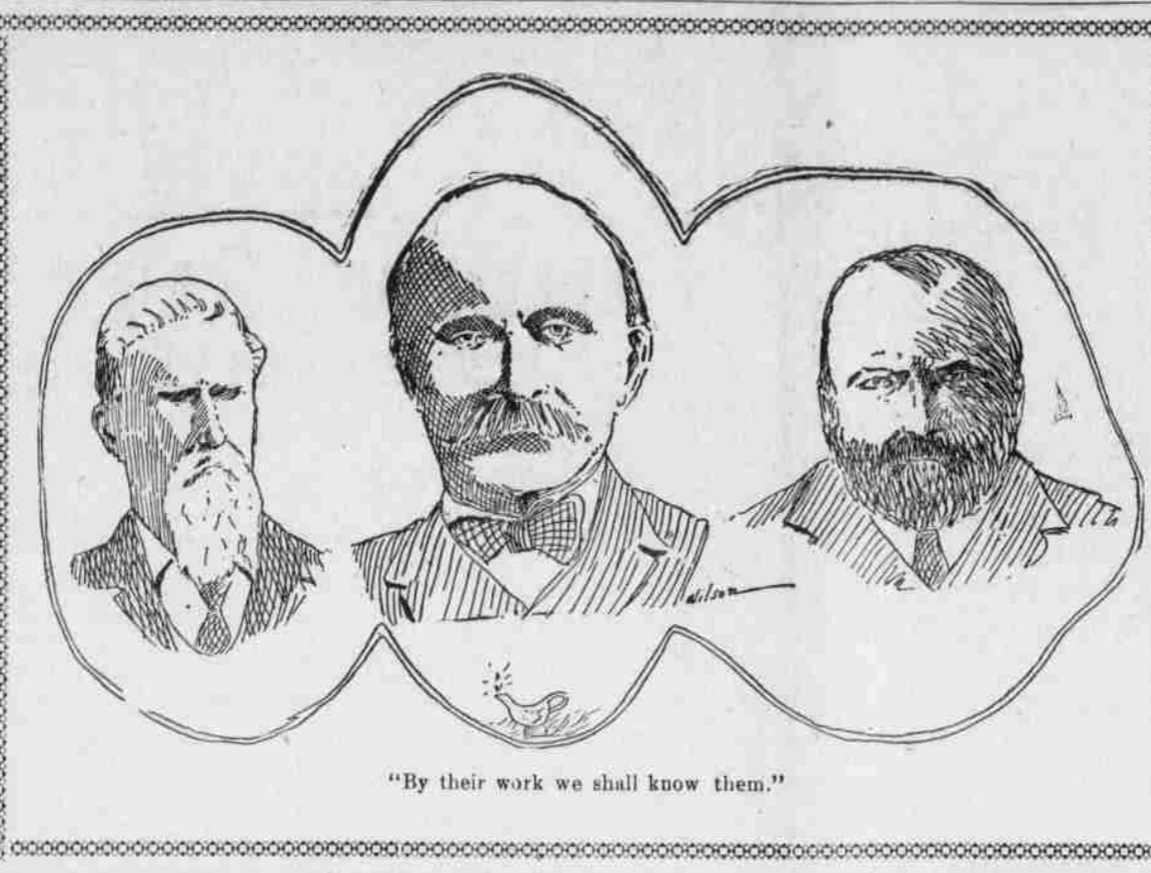

A Magazine's Immense Mail.

Few persons have an idea of the enormous amount of mail received during the busier seasons of the year by so large a house as The Curtis Publishing Company, of Philadelphia, which publishes The Ladies' Home Journal and The Saturday Evening Post. With this company the month of December usually brings the heaviest daily mails, and on a Thursday last December all previous records were broken. On that day the actual number of letters received was 9080. These contained 18,177 subscriptions and 115,498.44 in express and money orders and in cash. To open, receipt for, tabulate and file these letters, and acknowledge each one separately, requires the work of a small army of young women, who, needless to say, have no time to spare.
