Total duties, export and import, levied on Philippine hemp, \$27.50-which is \$7.50 per ton more than we levy on raw hemp from any foreign country. And every cent of these duties, which hit the poor Filipines both "going and coming," is imposed and collected without the representation or the consent of the 9,000,000 of Filipino people whose leading industry they affect.
