Mean or normal temperature, 47 degrees. The warmest month was that of 1890, with an average of 54 degrees. The coldest month was that of 1897, with an average of 40 degrees. The highest temperature was 79 degrees on the 29th, 1886. The lowest temperature was 20 degrees on the 2nd, 1896. Average date on which first "killing" frost occurred in autumn, November 15. Average date on which last "killing" frost occurred in spring, March 17.

PRECIPITATION.

Average for the month, 5.29 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 17. The greatest monthly precipitation was 12.78 inches in 1873. The least monthly precipitation was .03 inches in 1885. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 2.25 inches on the 26th, 1883. The greatest amount of snowfall recorded in any 24 consecutive hours (record extending to winter of 1884-85 only) was 3.0 inches on the 20th, 1887. Average number of clear days, 6. Partly cloudy days, 10. Cloudy days, 15. The prevailing winds have been from the south. The highest velocity of the wind was 55 miles from the on the 25th, 1898.
