BROOKLYN BRIDGE. Heat and Cold Raise and Lower the Great Structure.

The engineer of the Brooklyn bridge states that the variation in the height of the center of that structure in summer and winter is three feet. This is due to the expansion of the wires by heat and their contraction by cold.
