**DENTAL BRIDGE WORK OF TO-DAY.**

By new methods we are able to produce this most beautiful and durable of all dental work without the least pain.

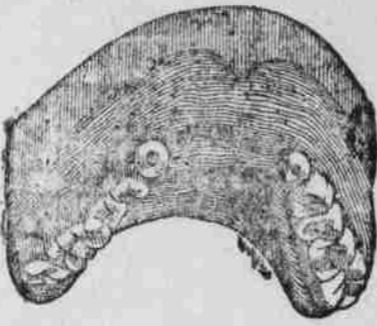


Figure 1 shows a mouth where the four incisors have been extracted, and the two cuspid (eye teeth); crowns destroyed to the gum line, showing the cuspid roots prepared to receive a bridge.



Figure 2 represents the bridge ready for adjustment.

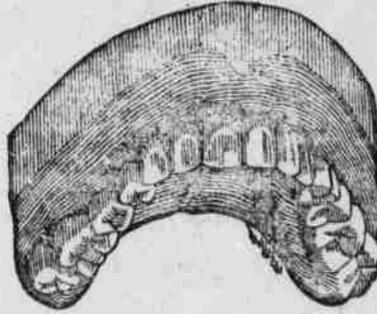


Figure 3 represents the case after the bridge has been placed in position.



Figure 4—it is useless to wear a plate in the mouth when a bridge can be attached to a few remaining teeth and roots.

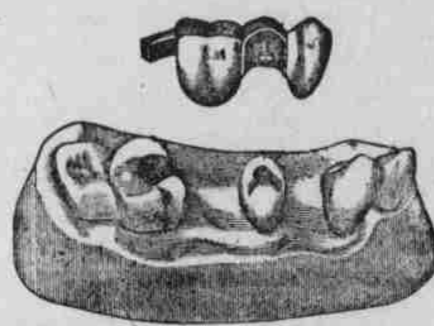


Figure 5 shows the loss of two upper teeth, the six rear molar and the first bicuspid. The bridge above is attached by an open face gold crown over the second bicuspid, and a bar which extends into a cavity of the adjoining molar.



Figure 6 shows the bridge anchored in position.

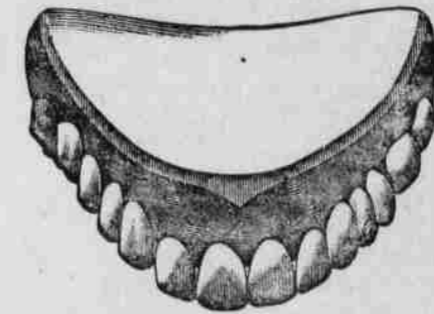


Figure 7 represents a full set of teeth on a gold plate.

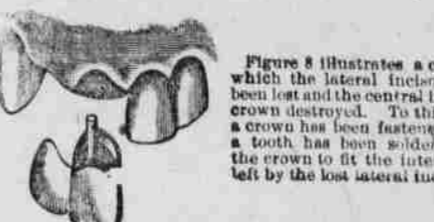


Figure 8 illustrates a case in which the lateral incisor has been lost and the central incisor crown destroyed. To this root a crown has been fastened and a tooth has been soldered to the crown to fit the lateral space left by the lost lateral incisor.

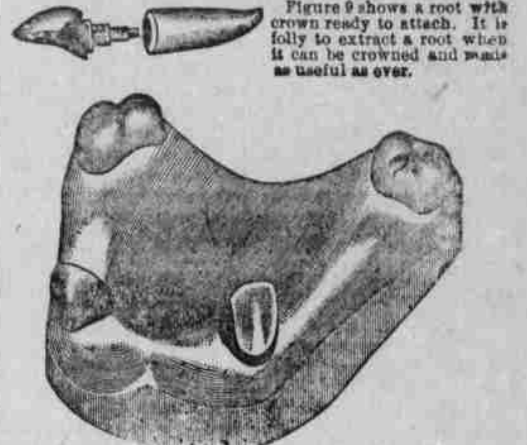


Figure 9 shows a root with crown ready to attach. It is folly to extract a root when it can be crowned and made as useful as ever.

Figure 10 is a mouth that has lost all the teeth but four—the two cuspid and two molars; they are shown as prepared for a full upper bridge.

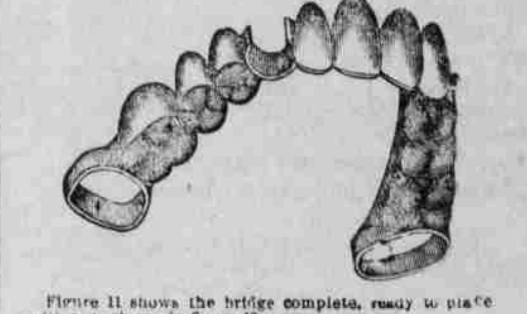


Figure 11 shows the bridge complete, ready to place in position, as shown in Figure 10.

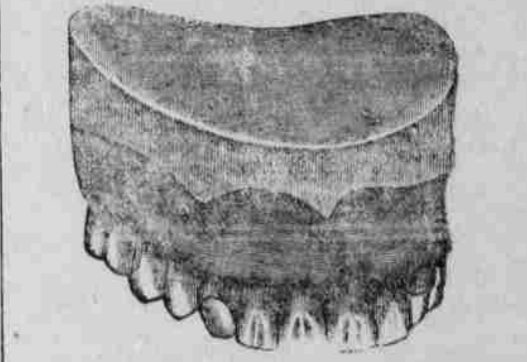


Figure 12 shows the bridge in place, as shown in Figure 11.

**NEWS OF THE WEEK.**

Wednesday, May 14.

It now transpires that 2,000 persons were killed on St. Vincent's Island, near Martinique. Relief supplies are being distributed to sufferers in Martinique. The President appoints committees to collect relief funds and supplies. The senate voted \$300,000 more for the relief of the West India sufferers. The house began consideration of the naval appropriation bill. China is unable to crush the rebellion in the Southern provinces. An ex-soldier complains of poor food given the army in the Philippines. Fort Hall, Idaho, Indian reservation will be thrown open to settlement, July 17. Mohair is advancing in the Portland market, and the owners of goat herds are happy. Twenty-six cents is now the ruling price.

Thursday, May 15.

The Fort de France correspondent of the London Times, in a dispatch describing the present conditions of Mount Pelee, says that the volcano is still rumbling, and that three luminous points on the lower slopes of the mountain which are casting incandescent rays seem to presage a further calamity. It is reported from various sources that President P. L. Campbell, of the state normal school at Monmouth, has been tendered the presidency of the University of Oregon by the board of regents. R. D. Inman, the citizens candidate for mayor of Portland, has resigned his membership of the Oregon state senate, and the politicians are in a quandary as how to proceed to nominate candidates to fill the vacancy.

**POLITICAL NOTES.**

There is considerable comment by republican stump speakers on the sheriff's semi-annual report in regard to his reporting \$27,000 on hand at time the report was made. True, he had \$27,000 deposited with the county treasurer on March 31 which was turned over as soon as same could be entered upon cash register, where it is apportioned to the several road and school districts, state, county, general school and city, which took in apportioning the same from 8 to 10 days, as can be seen by consulting the records which are open to all. Note the next semi-annual report and you will see that the sheriff will turn over more in the month of April than he collects, just as he has in the month of November, in the report now in question.

Under the administrations of Sheriff Cooke and Clerk Cooper the expenses of these officers have been less than of any former term, notwithstanding the enormous amount of extra work caused by the new assessment and tax collecting laws. We have on several occasions published the figures and nearly every voter is acquainted with the facts. Clerk Cooper is running for re-election and Cooke's chief deputy is running for sheriff. A word to the wise is sufficient.

The election of Wm. Johnson of Damascus as assessor is now conceded by the opposition. He is qualified in every way for the position.

Alfred Lnellng for treasurer, will no doubt receive a good share of the socialist votes. He was one of the very first to take up this movement and was a member of the socialist club long before the nomination were made.

The report in Enterprise that the treasurer and sheriff was holding \$52,000, which should be applied to paying warrants is an error. It so happened that on the first of April there was about \$27,000 on hand in treasurer's office, but on April 4th that official made a call as well as another on April 18th. Since that time the treasurer has paid out \$57,000 redeeming warrants. Calls are made as fast as there is money on hand and the treasurer cannot help it because holders of warrants will not call and get their money.
