NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Friday, May 16.
Ninth A month ago a bill was re-circuited from the United States senate committee on judiciary, providing for an additional judge in the ninth circuit. The bill has never passed; just why, no one can find out. As soon as the bill was reported, a large number of candidates at once came forward and petitions were numerous circulated and signed, asking for the appointment of different lawyers to this place. Judge Hannaford, of the state of Washington, is strongly endorsed, and Washington state has put in a claim for the additional judge, saying that California has two circuit judges, and Oregon one, and if there is to be an additional judge, Washington should receive the honor. Other candidates from Washington have appeared, and some from California. Perhaps this undue haste in scrambling for the judicial position has had something to do with holding up the bill.

England is slow in sending relief to West India sufferers. Dr. Henry Vanduyke was elected moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly. Anthracite miners vote to continue the strike. Imperfect returns indicate that the registration in Oregon is 10,000 less than in 1900. Very rich ore has been rediscovered in the Golconda mine. Iron production for April beat the world in the United States. A. A. Morse was re-elected president of the Oregon Sunday School Association. George T. Myers was nominated by Multnomah county republicans as a candidate for state senator, for the vacancy caused by the resignation of R. D. Inman. William Allen White, the Kansas editor and author, visits Portland. William Holl, a Portland money-lender, loses \$1200 on account of his safe being robbed at the noon hour, while he was hurriedly eating lunch.

Saturday, May 17.
Indian For the first time since efforts have been made to get Pensions. Its success for Indian war veterans, the house of representatives seems favorable to the passage of the bill that has already passed the senate. Its success at this session of congress is deemed probable.

Another bad fire has resulted seriously to on-lookers. Men, women and children, watching a blaze in the Chicago stock yards, overloaded a viaduct, which collapsed, injuring 29 persons. The most complete lard refinery in the United States, owned by Armour & Co., burned, with a loss of between \$750,000 and \$800,000. Seven hundred men at work in the building made their escape. The fire originated with the explosion of three lard tanks. Mount Pelee shows signs of continued activity. The commander of the Cincinnati reports on relief work at Martinique. Emperor William will present to the United States a statue of Frederick, the Great. Carnegie offers to buy the Philippines for \$20,000,000, provided that he has assurance that the United States will ultimately recognize the independence of the Philippines. Oregon intercollegiate team won from the Washington debaters. Governor Geer did not attend the republican rally at Salem. Vein running 50 per cent in gold has been discovered in the Golconda mine. State of Washington will have 90 days in which to select 87,000 acres of arid land. Consumption of iron keeps pace with the enormous production. Fritz Stashus who stabbed C. E. Buckley, caught at Holbrook. Port of Portland decides to borrow money by popular loan.

Sunday, May 18.
Alphonso XIII, reaching the age of 16, became King of Spain yesterday, and the regency of the Queen mother came to an end. A gorgeous procession from the palace to the chamber of deputies was the feature of the celebration. The reception met with the procession was, on the whole, lukewarm on the part of immense crowds, composed chiefly of people who had gathered to witness the pageant out of curiosity. On the Puerta del Sol, no cheer was raised until the king arrived there, when he received an ovation, mainly, however, from the spectators who packed the windows and balconies. There was some cheering from the people in the streets and hats were waved, but many men did not even uncover their heads.

The Kaiser may come to Washington to the unveiling ceremonies of the statue of Frederick the Great. The Schley-Sampson controversy was revived in the house. The body of General Rosecrans was re-interred at Arlington cemetery. A Negro riot at Atlanta, Ga., resulted in eight deaths. P. L. Campbell resigns the presidency of the Monmouth Normal school, and accepts the presidency of the University of Oregon. B. L. Stone, a pioneer jeweler, of Portland, is dead.

Monday, May 19.
Tornado A dispatch from Dallas, Ruides Texas, says that advice from all available sources here last night were that a disastrous cyclone swept across Texas yesterday, causing loss of life, and almost incalculable damage to property. The cyclone is believed to have originated on the gulf coast at a point almost directly south of Galvestad, and traveled in a northeasterly direction as far as Kentucky. It left desolation behind it in four states, but Texas seems to have suffered more than others. At Goliad 90 persons are dead and 100 or more are injured. At Wailus Park and San Antonio and other points great damage was done. Wires went down while the report was coming this morning, so it is impossible to say what the extent of the havoc wrought by the storm was.

Plot A dispatch from Madrid says Against that an anarchist plot King against King Alphonso has been discovered, and six arrests, including that of Gabriel Lopez, an employe of an insurance company, have been made. Dynamite cartridges were found on the premises where Lopez was arrested. Lopez says he received a package of cartridges from another anarchist with instructions to throw them at the moment of the passage of the royal carriage in yesterday's procession.

Martinique A dispatch to the Matin Volcano in Paris from Port de Active, France, dated Saturday, 17, says that during the previous night 15 violent denotations were heard, and they were accompanied by lightning which lit up the entire island. The eruption redoubled in violence, says the dispatch, and for a moment a second catastrophe was feared. New craters are forming in the neighborhood of Le Precheur. In spite of the danger which threatens them, the refugees from the northern part of the island are beginning to return to their homes.

United States trade in far East shows great gains. Jewish women of New York have organized a crusade against the meat trust. Salem Presbyterians celebrated 33rd anniversary of organization. Representative H. A. Smith, of Portland, dies of intestinal hemorrhage. E. H. Harriman arrives in Portland today.

Tuesday, May 20.
Coal In a Tennessee coal mine, three miles from the explosion, traces of the workings, an explosion of gas resulted in instant death to about 200 men. Ten hours after the disaster a rescue party reached the scene, only to find that not one of the men working underneath had escaped. As the rescuers proceeded, they walked along one continuous tomb of death. Crowds of women went wild with grief, crowded about the mouth of the pit, hoping that in the innermost recesses of the mine some had escaped.

The House passed the naval appropriation bill. The eight hour bill was passed by the House. Deliver spoke in the senate in favor of the Philippine bill. A plot against the life of Francis Joseph was frustrated. Great Britain was swept by a severe storm. In the Goliad, Texas, tornado 98 persons were killed and 103 injured. The Presbyterian assembly began the celebration of the centennial of home missions. Heavy slump in Portland potato market, due to large receipts at San Francisco. E. H. Harriman promises extension of the O. R. & N. along Snake river to Lewiston. The Northern Pacific will assist in constructing the line, and will use it jointly with the O. R. & N.
