THE John A. Roebling's Sons Company, of Trenton, N. J., has increased the wages of its 40,000 employes, averaging 10 per cent. The increase was made, as explained by C. G. Roebling, "in consequence of the increased cost of living to which our employes have been subjected."

CAROL D. Wright, the labor commissioner, states that the 22,793 strikes, which took place since 1881 cost the strikers \$27,863,478, and the employers \$122,781,121. PAUL Maurice, of 8 Rue Buisson, St. Etienne, France, claims that he has invented a centrifugal gold washer which will save from 98 to 99 per cent of the gold in auriferous sands, the water used being limited to simply moistening the material treated. The washer is essentially a centrifugal turbine revolving at a speed of from 200 to 600 revolutions a minute. No quick silver is used, all the rusty, float, flake and very fine gold being saved by the force of gravity.

GEORGE H. DARWIN, the eminent mathematician, shows by his calculations that the earth is in internal stress. The specific gravity of water being placed at 1, that of the densest rock known to geologists is 2.8, but the density of the entire earth is 5.66. The conclusion formed is that the center of the earth is fearfully compressed, or is composed entirely of metals. THE Atmospheric Product Company of Niagara Falls has been incorporated with a capital of \$1,000,000 for the purpose of manufacturing fixed nitrogen out of the atmosphere by means of electric arcs of small current and high electromotive force. The reddish-brown gas generated, a trioxide of nitrogen, results in nitric acid in contact with water, with caustic potash, saltpetre, and in contact with many other substances valuable salt result. Chili saltpetre being a valuable fertilizer, through this process enough can be made from the air to supply the world for all time to come.
