Why Rabbits Do Not Kill.
Cheese to be digestible should be cooked, says a scientific cook. Some people think it is only a fad to put grated cheese on crackers and cook them in the oven, but that is an excellent way of preparing this food. The Welsh rarebit, or rabbit, if properly made, is another good way of cooking cheese and is more digestible than the piece of cheese we eat with apple pie. When adding cheese to a dish, do not sprinkle it in layers, but melt it thoroughly in heated butter. Cheese to be digestible should be crumbled finely or grated, if eaten raw, and when cooked should be dissolved with milk or broth or vegetable juices.

Six-Year Molar

One of the things that parents of young children are least informed about in dentistry is the Six Year Molar. Almost every mother who goes to the dentist with her child in trouble with toothache contends that it is the first or "baby tooth." This is a sad mistake. The tooth should be looked after and filled before the teeth are gone beyond repair. This is one of the most important teeth in the mouth, as the regularity of the permanent teeth depends upon its maintenance. It usually comes when the child is about six years old, hence its name, and should by all means be saved and not extracted, for the good of the child in after years.
