Iowa republicans in Henderson's district name Judge Birdsall as his successor and indorse Roosevelt.

 Heinze to try to form a new party to overthrow Senator Clark in Montana.  
 Charlemagne Tower will succeed Andrew D. White as Ambassador to Germany.  
 Roumania stops emigration of Jews as a result of Hay's note.  
 One thousand people buried under lava from volcano in East Turkestan.

### Weather Report.

The following data, covering a period of 30 years, have been compiled from the weather bureau records at Portland, Oregon, for the month of October:  
 Mean or normal temperature, 54 degrees.  
 The warmest month was that of 1901, with an average of 59 degrees.  
 The coldest month was that of 1893, with an average of 50 degrees.  
 The highest temperature was 83 degrees on the 7th, 1891.  
 The lowest temperature was 31 degrees on the 31st, 1877, and 3rd, 1895.

Average date on which first "killing" frost occurred in autumn, November 15th.  
 Average date on which last "killing" frost occurred in spring, March 17th.  
 Average precipitation for the month. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 13.  
 The greatest monthly precipitation was 11.58 inches in 1882.  
 The least monthly precipitation was a trace in 1895.  
 The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in and 24 consecutive hours was 2.96 inches on the 9th and 10th, 1882.  
 Average number of clear days, 8.  
 Partly cloudy days, 11.  
 Cloudy days, 12.  
 The prevailing winds have been from the northwest.  
 The highest velocity of the wind was 42 miles from the southeast on the 23rd, 1897.

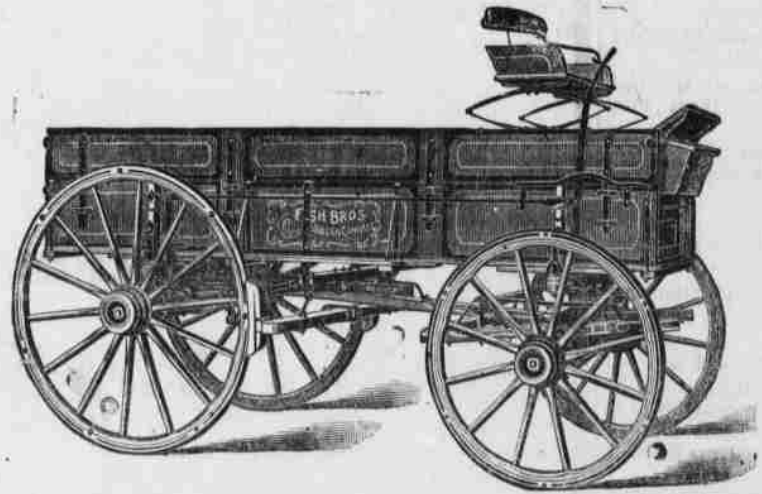
