Bird Killer.
Every spring and fall large numbers of birds are killed by the Washington monument. The city of Washington seems to be directly in the route taken by many of the migratory birds in the flight between the north and the south, and twice a year thousands of feathered songsters meet their death by flying against the tall marble shaft in the night. Just now the fall slaughter is at its height and every morning many birds are to be seen about the base of the monument. The dogs and cats of that part of the city have learned that the base of the monument is a good place to get an early meal in the morning without trouble, and many of them are regularly on hand. Most of the birds killed are yellow and black throated warblers and small thrushes.

Stone Age Picture Gallery.
A picture gallery that dates from the stone age has been unearthed in a cavern near Byzies, France. The pictures, which are all of prehistoric animals, were not only cut in the rock, as is usually the case with such representations, but were painted in several colors and give some evidences of artistic skill. There are eighty pictures, of which forty-nine represent bisons of various kinds. The pigments used, which are shades of red and brown, have been found on analysis by Moissan, the eminent French chemist, to be ochers mixed with minute fragments of transparent silica.

A Detective in a Barrel.
A Paris detective recently concealed himself in an empty wine barrel at night to find some explanation of the frequent thefts of wine from the stores at Bercy. As he expected, the thieves took him off in his barrel with others holding their proper contents to their headquarters, a disused factory, and so enabled him to get all the information he wanted and to secure the arrest of the four thieves.
