Roosevelt and the Trusts.
With your permission will call your attention to something that strikes me as the worst piece of demagoguery that I have noticed since the June election in Oregon. We find the following in the daily Oregonian of the 3rd: Speaking of the President's message on the trust question you will find the following when President Roosevelt said, as he has many times, that a constitutional amendment is a necessary preliminary to true regulation. He spoke upon perfect information. He didn't know, for he had tackled the trust problem as he does all others with a catch as catch can chiefly as a hook for his didactic aphorisms, so he just jumped at the conclusion. From Attorney General Knox he has learned the still untried capacities of the Sherman anti-trust law and its entirely feasible amendments. Therefore, he now says we have the power without the amendment, though at Boston in August he assured the country that legislative amendment would only be as bricks without straw. Now, would you ever? Why did he not tell the people this before the fall elections simply this the people would have asked him what have you and that trust attorney of yours been doing you have not enforced the law? Another thing, by being truthful the Democrats might have gotten the lower of congress and also the Socialist vote might have been a few more. Now we can draw no other conclusion than this that he is either a fool or keeping a man in his cabinet that does not enforce the law (if he, the President, is honest in his opinions) a knave if he does know that law would be effective. President Roosevelt, W. J. Bryan and all the leading men know in fact they cannot reach the trust by enactment of prohibitory laws. The sensible conclusion is "does the government own the trust or the trust own the government?"
