The Speed of a Quail. While the writer was riding a bicycle on the road near the base line bridge he startled two Oregon quails, one of which took flight and the other one started to run along the road. The bicycle was traveling at about 11 miles an hour and the quail was able to keep at the same distance ahead. The rider tried speeding up a little, to about 12 miles, when the quail was seen to be losing ground. After maintaining this speed for about 200 feet, the entire distance was about 450 feet, the quail's wings were seen to slowly move out from the body and a slight fluttering to take place. At the same time the bird gradually raised from the ground until the wings were about half spread, the feet were useless for propelling purposes, and the bird turned aside and entered the brush just as the bicycle was passing it. At no time did the quail use its wings while running, and when the wings were used at the last end the whirr was not heard. 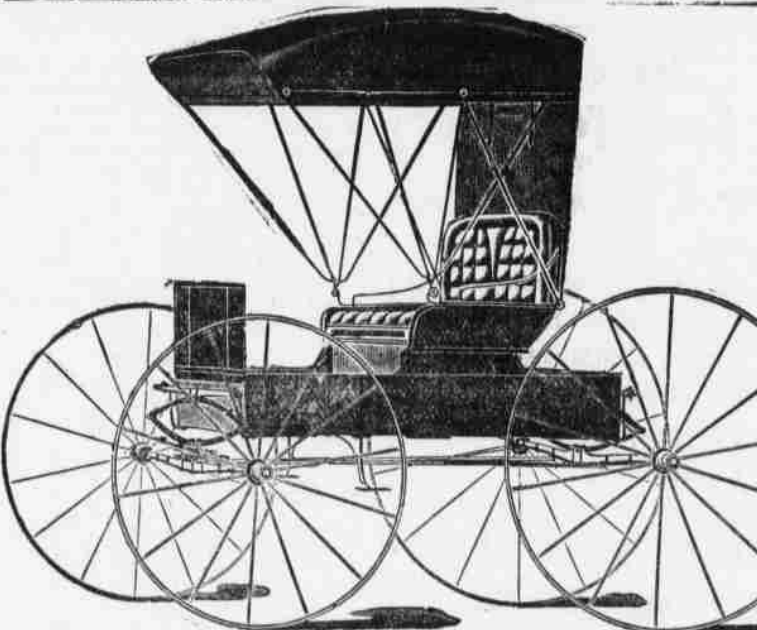
