## REAMS AND HERMAN

EACH PLAYING FOR THE VOTE OF CLACKAMAS COUNTY.

A Week of Lively Politics and More to Follow.

Democrats Confident of Electing Their Man, Republicans on the Defensive.

The past week has been a lively one in the politics of Clackamas county. Both Democrats and Republicans have been hard at work arranging the details of the last ten days of the campaign and each striving with might and main to arouse interest in the coming election. The Republican cohorts are more than inordinately cold. They are lethargic. They are absolutely indifferent. They don't care a "Tinkers d—m" whether Herman is elected or not and this condition of affairs is alarming the Republican managers of Oregon City. The Democrats on the contrary are more enthusiastic. They feel they have a chance to win and they determined to take advantage of the situation.

### HERMAN COMES TO TOWN.

Binger Herman the Republican candidate for Congress as per his previous announcement arrived in Oregon City on the Albany local on last Thursday morning. He was met at the depot by Judge Thomas F. Ryan, Lord Brownell and a few lesser lights in the Republican firmament. He immediately put his famous handshake into operation and all day Thursday was telling the boys what a good fellow he was and what a great thing it would be for the state of Oregon if he were elected to Congress. The Honorable Binger is a man of considerable pomposity. He is also a man of considerable pugnacity. He is well fed and well groomed. He feels his keep. He was glad to meet the boys and told them so. His affability was spontaneous and general. He smiled and bowed to all. His arm worked like a pump handle and he let no grass grow under his feet; but the boys did not enthuse. He neither smokes nor drinks but when it comes to shaking hands and jollying the boys he is a past master.

### HE SPEAKS AT SHIVELY'S HALL IN THE EVENING.

In the evening the Republican hosts and a few good Democrats and lookers on "marched up the hill and then marched down again." The speaking was at Shively's hall. In order to draw a crowd the Oregon City brass band decorated sweet music and the Honorable Lord Brownell and Senator John M. Mitchell were also advertised to speak. A goodly sized crowd gathered to hear the little and big guns of the Republican party and also hear something which they did not hear, the sweet singing of the Macabee quartet which had been billed to sing the Republicans into the "sweet by and by" but they were not on the bill of fare and thereby hangs a tale.

Judge Thomas F. Ryan, chairman of the Republican county committee called

the meeting to order and stated that the grand old Republican party was still doing business at the old stand and that Oregon was the best state in the union and always would be as long as the Republicans were in office.

There were some twenty chairs upon the stage and there was plenty of room for fifty prominent Republicans to get behind the foot lights but there was only four local Republicans on the stage and the other shining lights were conspicuous by their absence.

Judge Ryan introduced Lord Brownell who in a ten minutes speech introduced Senator Mitchell. Brownell was evidently not at his best. His face was care worn and wrinkled. His liver was evidently out of "fix." His voice was harsh and he could not get into tune with his audience. His introductory remarks were a flat failure and not a whisper of applause greeted his appearance or his remarks.

Senator Mitchell did not attempt to make a speech. His remarks were common place. He looked old, tired and sick, and we suppose he was all of these. He received some applause, but it was sporadic and not enthusiastic. In fact the crowd was cold and the atmosphere resembled that of Jim Lovitt's ice factory. There were a few faithful souls planted around the crowd who tried to lead and start the applause but the effort was abortive and the boys refused to wake up to the situation.

About the coldest thing that happened was when Senator Mitchell said "That I am now a member of the United States senate from the state of Oregon and that I am able to assist in the maintenance of the prosperity in this country under the beneficent administration of our great President Roosevelt, is due solely and along to the magnificent work and great political sagacity of your brilliant State Senator, the Hon. George C. Brownell." Senator Mitchell stopped and looked around and waited for the applause which he evidently thought was sure to follow in a perfect whirlwind of enthusiasm. The silence was absolutely painful. It was evident to the uninitiated that the name of Brownell was longer one with which to conjure in Clackamas county.

### AT MOLALLA AND CANBY.

Mr. Herman was taken out to Molalla on Friday by Judge Ryan and a few faithful souls, and he spoke there to about seventy-five people in the afternoon and from thence was taken to Canby and repeated the performance at night to a fair sized audience. At both places he found the Republicans cold and indifferent. In fact the cold "dog wood winter" of the past ten days is illustrative of just how cold the Republicans of Clackamas county are at the present time.

Mr. Herman returned to Oregon City on Saturday morning and worked the "hand shake" proposition all day. He will return to Clackamas again before the election.

### HON. A. E. REAMS SPEAKS AT THE ARMORY.

Hon. A. E. Reams of Jackson county the Democratic candidate for Congress dropped into Oregon City on Friday morning. He was met at the depot by Chairman of the state central committee, J. P. Lovitt and Ch I man of the county committee R. B. Beattie and a host of the "uninitiated." Mr. Reams is a young man hardly yet in the prime of life. He is the district attorney for the southern district of the state of Oregon. He is a good lawyer and a fine citizen without a spot or blemish on his character. He was royally received in Oregon City. He put in the day getting acquainted around town, meeting Democrats and Republicans alike. He is a good mixer and makes a fine appearance.

### THE SPEAKING AT THE ARMORY

It has been many a day since any candidate for office has been more royally received in Oregon City than was Mr Reams at the Armory on last Friday night. The large hall was fairly well filled with the very best people of Oregon City. Laboring men, lawyers, doctors and business men and a goodly sprinkling of ladies. The meeting was called to order by Chairman Lovitt and Dr. W. E. Carl introduced as the Chairman of the meeting. The doctor made a short speech of the humorous order which set the house to laughing and put all in a splendid good humor. He then introduced Sam White some times called "Roaring Sam" Chairman of the Democratic Central Committee of the state. He made a short and telling speech and set the audience to going right. Dr Carl then called upon Col. R. A. Miller to introduce the speaker of the evening Hon. A. E. Reams and this he did in the style.

Mr Reams was met at the every out set of his remarks with a burst of applause. He is a fine speaker and was at his best. We can't repeat his speech. It was in elegant taste, was free from abuse but all the same was just to the point and time and time again he was interrupted with loud and long applause as he made a telling bit and scored hard upon his opponent. His speech was enlivened with anecdotes, and stories aptly told and pointedly applied. He spoke an hour and when he finished not a dozen persons out of the large crowd present had left the hall, nearly every one crowded around him to wish him god speed in his good work and pledge their best support to him in the contest. The meeting from a stand point of party enthusiasm, good temper, and hearty cooperation was in marked contrast to the one held at the Opera house the night before. One was an ice plant working over time the other a hot house where every thing bloomed and laughed in the sun shine.

### NOTES.

The Macabee Quartette was billed to sing at the Republican meeting at Shively's opera house but did not because no arrangements had been made

to have them do so. They are a little sore at their treatment as a goodly number of their friends attended the meeting for the sole purpose of hearing the celebrated singers and when they did not appear they were pretty sore. The people should not mind however. It is not unusual for a circus to bill animals and performances on their show bills that are not to be found in the tent or shown in the saw dust arena.

The Democratic Central committee of Clackamas county held a very enthusiastic meeting in Room No. 10 in the Weinhard building on Saturday afternoon and made final arrangements for the conducting of the last week of the campaign. The meeting was largely attended, nearly every precinct in the county being present in person. Much enthusiasm was manifested and it was evident that something was doing. From reports brought in from the county precincts the majority cast in this county last year for Furnish will be almost wiped out and possibly entirely wiped out.

The Republicans are only claiming Clackamas county 250 majority. "How the mighty have fallen." Last year Furnish the Republican candidate for governor received nearly 400 majority over George Chamberlain. The Democrats concede nothing.

O N. White of Canby, chairman of the Congressional committee for this county was in Oregon City Friday and Saturday. He says, look out for Canby. A majority for Reams is almost in sight. We have the boys on the run sure.

Uncle "Billy" Vaughan and Longstreet Molalla attended the committee meeting on last Saturday and they unite in saying that Molalla will give the biggest Democratic majority in its history. Good, that sounds like business.

The sack committee of the Republican Congressional campaign in Clackamas county held a star Chamber session in a private office in the Weinhard building on Sunday night. A "full" attendance was present.

The question was discussed as to who "held the sack" and when it should be opened or whether it should be opened at all or not.

Bulletins will be issued from time to time as the "sack" committee reports progress.

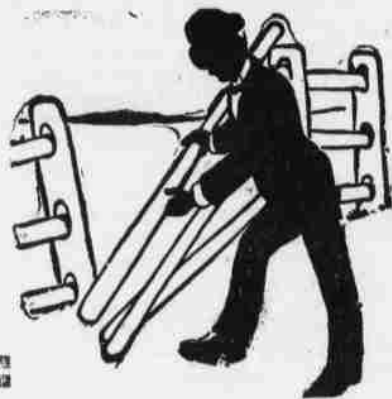
