Excitement Growing

More Prospecting Parties Leave for Ogle Creek.

Great Prospects for Rich Gold Mines.

The Ogle Creek mining country is just at the present time the mecca for hundreds of Clackamas county people. The published reports of a rich strike in the neighborhood of Ogle Creek has not been without its effects. Last Saturday a party of twenty left for the new fields from Molalla. Another party left from Oregon City the same day. The purpose of all was the same—to file on mineral claims. The parties who went from Oregon City were, Charles W. Kelly, Lino E. Jones, John Huert and Frank Welsh.

Saturday Joe Harless brought in from Ogle Creek 300 pounds of specimens of ore. While not as rich as the ore already on exhibition by the Fairclough boys, it is yet rich enough to attract many people to the new fields. Harless owns an interest in the new mines. He is sure that they will prove very valuable, and believes that the main ledge has finally been struck. He says that only two men are at the present time engaged in working the mines. They are paid the sum of \$2 per day and board. It is not improbable that a larger crew will be put to work shortly.

The location of the Ogle Creek mines is more than fifty miles from Oregon City, just over the line in Marion county. One can drive a good part of the way and after he has reached the foothills can take pack horses and traverse the remainder of the distance without much effort. The journey consumes about two days.

Next Saturday a crowd of Oregon City and Molalla people will start for the new fields. They will be accompanied by John Fairclough, of this place, and Joe Harless, of Molalla. If there is gold in the mountains in this section of the country in paying quantities it will undoubtedly be discovered before the snow flies.

Prospecting has been going on in the Ogle Creek country for the past thirty years, and traces of gold have frequently been found, but the late strike of gold is the only one that has ever been made that really amounts to a great deal. While the results of the recent find so far have amounted to little, save to call the attention of the world to that section, there seems a strong probability that future developments will amount to a great deal and may open up a great gold field that will cause any hitherto discovered in this section of the country to pale into insignificance.

Fraternalism

As Expounded by Lord Brownell at Highland.

Lord Brownell is a good deal like the preacher who said after taking his text, I preach from my text and the longer I preach the farther I get from it. It is "A long cry," from Fraternalism and Brotherly love as taught by the Maccabees and Republicans of the Brownell pattern.

Drowned in Abernethy

Perrin Latourette Meets Death While Bathing.

Starts to Country With Father but Stops to go Swimming and Was Drowned.

Perrin Latourette, the 11-years old son of D. C. Latourette, was drowned in the Abernethy in the northern part of this city last Wednesday afternoon about four o'clock. The lad had started to the country with his father but upon arriving at the Abernethy found a number of his playmates in swimming. He prevailed upon the father to let him get out and go swimming with the boys while Mr. Latourette drove on to the country. The water in the Abernethy is quite deep in places and at this particular spot there is a hole several feet in depth. Young Latourette got beyond his depth and sank to the bottom of the stream. He could not swim and became excited. Grabbing hold of the root of a stump underneath the water he clung to it like grim death until he was drowned.

After some little time the body was recovered by one of the boys swimming with him. It is said that it was almost impossible to cause him to release his grip upon the root of the stump which he had seized. Every effort was made to revive him but to no avail. The father returning from his trip to the country found the corpse of the son and took him home in his buggy, wrapped in a shawl. The mother had not been notified of the accident and when the lifeless body was brought into the house she fainted away.

The boy was an exceptionally bright and precocious boy. He was the youngest son and the pet of the family. He was only a boy and he is dead. Drowned while playing with his mates in the water. He was a manly little fellow, the apple of his father's eye, the darling of his mother's heart. Every father and every who have a boy can give them their hand and consolation. That is all. Beyond the river we may meet again, but we love our boys, God bless them. Clinton Latourette, the father of the boy, is one of the best known and best liked men in Oregon City. To him and his good wife we extend our condolence.

The funeral services will be conducted from the residence this afternoon at 3 o'clock. Rev. J. H. Beaven, of the Baptist church officiating and the remains buried at Mountain View cemetery.

Barn Burned.

John Baker, who lives four miles from this city on the Molalla road, lost a barn by fire Wednesday afternoon. Baker was away and the fire was probably caused by spontaneous combustion. Mrs. Baker saw the flames licking up the barn and ran out and tried to save some of the machinery that was stored in it. As a result she was badly burned on the hands and arms. All of the farming machinery, a considerable amount of hay and feed stuffs were consumed. The loss is about \$500; insurance \$100. Mrs. Baker's injuries are serious. She suffers intensely, and it will be weeks before she recovers.

Big Mill Purchased

Portland Flouring Mill Company Buys Mill at Everett.

Daily Output of 9,600 Barrels of Flour by the Company.

The Portland Flouring Mills Company last Saturday purchased the entire plant stock good will and fixtures of the Everett Roller Mills of Everett, Washington. This mill, which was built about two years ago, is said to be one of the finest on the coast and has a daily output of 850 barrels. The new owners will immediately increase it to 2,000 barrels per day. The new addition gives the company a total of 15 mills in Oregon and Washington, with a daily capacity of nearly 10,000 barrels of flour. It is stated that it requires 43,000 bushels of wheat per day to keep them all running at their usual capacity, and a single week's output would make the large cargo of flour ever floated.

The Everett Mill with its present capacity is third on the list in size and its numerical position will not be changed when its capacity is enlarged. The Portland mill is still at the head of the system, with a capacity of 2,500 barrels, the Tacoma mill coming next with 2,300 barrels. The Oregon City mill is fifth on the list with an output of 900 barrels per day. Following is a list of the mills with their capacity, operated by the Portland Flouring Mills Company.

WILL LEAVE MONDAY.

Oregon City Fire Department Will Go to Astoria.

Eighteen members of the fire department of Oregon City will leave Monday for Astoria to attend the Regatta and participate in the various events of the meeting. The party going will be under the charge of Fire Chief Ruconich and Captain the I. W. Pope.

It is quite likely that a new fire alarm system will be installed in Oregon City. The matter has been presented to the city council which is said to be favorable to the move. The system is known as the Gamewell fire alarm system. There will be five fire alarm boxes in the city under the proposed plan. The new system will cost the city something like \$2,500. The cost, however, will be small compared with the benefits that will accrue and the improvement in the service.
