If the rangers would place the trail from Elk lake to Panaz basin and that from the latter point to the Clackamas hot springs and thence on to the Miners' Ford in equally good condition, traveling in the mountains would be a veritable pleasure instead of a toilsome task as it is now.

If the trail to the Clackamas springs were shortened, as it could be, by keeping on the ridge from the ford over the the Molalla, even an invalid would find a horseback journey from Molalla to the springs an easy and pleasant trip. A delightful spot to visit is Elk lake, but with the trail thither as it is, only a few care to make the trip. A couple of forest rangers who love mountain life and know their business could in a few months make a wonderful improvement in our trails and thereby induce more people from the cities to visit the numerous points of interest and beauty in the Cascades located in this county and on the corners of neighboring counties. Even a stupid man taking a mountain trip, becomes convinced of the fact that only one used to mountain life who does not lose himself when off a trail is worth his salt as a ranger. It is an open secret that appointments of this kind have been secured as reward for political service.

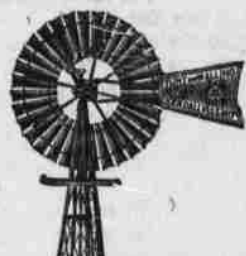

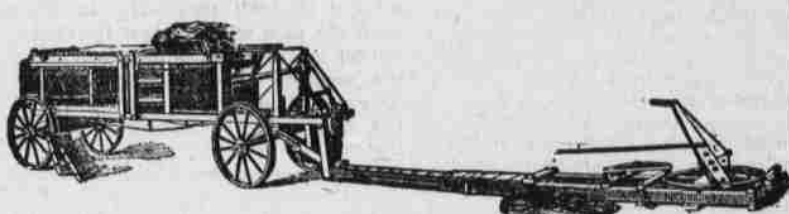

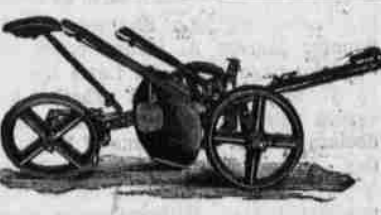
