Mr. Jarvis who bought Mrs. Yoder's farm last spring, expects to move onto his property sometime this winter.

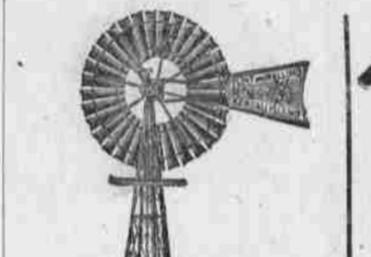
Idyn Bowers who bought Mr. Roop's tract some months ago, moved in where Mr. King vacated.

With your permission as a stock raiser would like to ask a few questions with such abounding property. Why is beef and mutton so cheap, when the farmers want to sell and so dear when the customers want to buy? Why do the Oregon City butchers refuse to buy by the pound, but say, I will give you so much a head, when they ask what are you giving per pound. They say they are not buying by the pound. Next why do they go to Portland and buy of the stock yard, when the farmers of this county are offering them as good as the same price?

How would the butchers feel if the citizens of Oregon City went to Portland and bought their meat? I was told by one of their customers that when he asked them what they paid for beef, said; We pay 4 cents per pound for good steers and 3 cents for cows. When asked if he could get plenty at that price said, n. The Clackamas farmers want too much for their stock. When in fact this same butcher is offered good beef at less and refused to come and look at them.

I see by the dispatches, that a car load of good beef was shipped from Oklahoma to Kansas City, when they arrived the stock only brought 1 cent per pound.

The beef Trust had something to do with that transaction. Are the Oregon City butchers in the combine, also sometime ago we were told that Teddy had busted the combine but it begins to look as if the trust had busted Teddy.

The high winds of yesterday destroyed a large quantity of fruit. Some of the fruit trees that were heavily loaded with fruit were broken down.

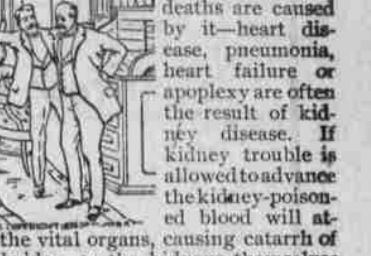

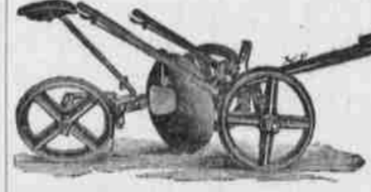
