POLITICS IN THE UNITED STATES SENATE.

The Washington Evening Post, one of the ablest newspapers of the United States, has been looking over the situation touching numbers, politics and terms of service, as will be observed by the following:

The new issue of the Congressional Directory shows that the senate is now squarely lined up between the Republican and Democratic parties, not a single member of the Upper House having described himself or being entered in the summary as an "Independent" of any description.

Of the Democrats seven expire in 1905, fourteen in 1907 and twelve in 1909. Thus the Republican ranks are more open to attack in the campaign of next year than are those of the Democrats.

The Democratic 1905 seats are from such sure strongholds as Tennessee, Missouri, Texas, Virginia, Mississippi and Florida, with Montana fairly wedded to Democracy.
