PORTLAND MARKETS

Eggs Plentiful--Poultry Keeps High--Block Hogs Scarce With Potatoes Up--Hops Scarce.

Portland, April 6, 1904.

Eggs continue weak, owing to large receipts, a decline in local demand and an absence of inquiry from the north. Dealers predict a further drop of 17 cents.

Very few chickens are in the market and the continued scarcity causes dealers to believe that the supply is short in the Northwest. Prices can go no higher, as the demand is even limited at present quotations, and consumers switch off to veal or some other substitute within reach of their purses.

The scarcity of "block hogs" continue a feature in Portland markets, and the present prices are considered a good inducement to producers to ship in were there any hogs to ship. The stock in this class of fresh meats is considered well-nigh exhausted for the season.

Potatoes are firm, and an advance of 5 cents per 100 pounds of fancy stock has taken place. Large numbers of Oregon potatoes are now being absorbed by the California market, and buyers here do not hesitate to purchase fancy grades that offer. One small lot of choice Burbanks brought \$1.25 yesterday for shipment to San Francisco.

The hop market continues dull, and few sales are reported. Some contracts are being made on the basis of 15 cents a pound for October delivery. The hop season of 1904 is a month earlier than usual as a result of protracted wet weather, and farmers find it difficult to work in the fields.

The supply of live stock sheep and hogs continues light, and prices firm. At this time of the year fat stock is scarce, and the scarcity will be likely to continue for two months.

"WHO OWNS THE EARTH?"

"Who owns the earth?" is a question which is asked and answered, at least apparently to his own satisfaction, by Mr. S. S. Pratt, editor of the World's Work, the Wall Street paper. Mr. Pratt is an authority on financial matters, and his statement of facts are as interesting as his conclusions. We herewith publish his statement in which he attempts to answer the question, "Who owns the earth?" Says Mr. Pratt among other things:

"One-twelfth of the estimated wealth of the United States is represented at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the United States Steel corporation when they are all present. They are: J. D. Rockefeller, Marshall Field, E. H. Gary, W. H. Moore, Henry C. Frick, W. E. Cory, F. H. Peabody, Charles Steels, P. A. B. Widener, James H. Reid, William Edenborn, E. C. Converse, J. P. Morgan, H. H. Rogers, George W. Perkins, Norman B. Ream, Charles M. Schwab, C. A. Griscom, Daniel G. Reid, J. D. Rockefeller, Jr., Alfred Clifford, Robert Bacon, N. Thayer, James Gayley.

"They represent as influential directors more than 200 other companies. These companies operate nearly one-half of the railroad mileage of the United States. They are the great miners and carriers of coal. Among these companies are such industrial trusts as the Standard Oil, the Amalgamated Copper, the International Harvester, the Pullman, the General Electric, the International Mercantile Marine, the United States Realty and Construction and the American Linseed. The leading telegraph system, the traction lines of New York, Philadelphia, of Pittsburgh, of Buffalo, of Chicago, and of Milwaukee, and one of the principal express companies are represented in the Board. The group includes also directors of five insurance companies, two of which have assets of \$700,000,000. In the Steel Board are men who speak for five banks and ten trust companies in New York City, including the First National, the National City and the Bank of Commerce, the three greatest banks in the country and the head of important chains of financial institutions; for two banks and three trust companies in Philadelphia; for two banks and two trust companies in Chicago; for one bank and two trust companies in Boston and for one bank and one trust company in Pittsburg, besides banking institutions in smaller cities. Telephone, electric, real estate, cable and publishing companies are represented there, and our greatest merchant sits at the board table."—Lexington Herald.

Five and Seven Cents.

Astoria, Or., April 4.—The Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Union at a meeting this evening fixed the opening prices for salmon of the Columbia River for the coming season at 5 cents per pound for fish weighing less than 25 pounds and 7 cents per pound for those weighing 25 pounds or over. This is the same price as last season for the small fish, but in advance of one cent for the large ones. The meeting also appointed a committee of nine to investigate and report at the next meeting on the question of affiliating with the fisherman's Protective Union of the Pacific Coast and Alaska.

Chicago, April 4.—Mrs. Emma L. Watson, under indictment at Portland, Ore., in connection with alleged larceny swindles, waived examination when arraigned before United States Commissioner Humphrey today.
