The Willamette school, Millard Hyatt principal closed last Friday. There were six graduates from the eighth grade.

On Thursday, the 16th of June, Miss Edith Cheney will open a photograph gallery in the Cheney Art Building at the corner of Main and Tenth streets.

A. B. Gleason, an early settler in the vicinity of Hubbard, was in town Thursday on his way to Sunk, Wash., where his son-in-law, E. C. Caldwell is living. After a brief visit, Mr. Gleason will return to his home in Hubbard.

Some years ago, say four or six, a recently elected republican sheriff presented a succession of exorbitant bills to the county court, which asked him to explain. "Why," said he "I spent a lot of money to get elected and want to get some of it back." But the county commissioners would not try the fat out of the taxpayers to reimburse him.

A delegation of taxpayers resident of the Molalla and Meadowbrook sections were in town Thursday for the purpose of laying before the County Court a petition for the construction of a bridge across the Molalla river at the point where Woodcock creek empties into it. About 150 names appeared on the petition. Action was deferred until a road can be surveyed on each side of the proposed bridge.

The directors of the Molalla Central Mining Company are considering the installation of a mill and a complete mining plant at their mines in Ogle Creek sometime this summer. Their properties there have proved richer with development, which has been continued all the past winter. About a week ago, a rich vein was struck by the miners, which shows up wide gold in plain view. It is thought by the directors that the property will be valuable as soon as machinery for reducing the ore can be secured and placed on the ground. The body of ore is thought to be extensive enough to warrant the purchase of machinery.

Rev. W. H. Wettlaufer, whose arrival from North Dakota was mentioned in last week's Courier, is doing some excellent work in building up and creating interest in the work of the German Evangelical Association. For the past year there has been no pastor in charge here, but the pulpit has been supplied from Portland. Rev. Wettlaufer announces preaching service every Sabbath at 11 a. m. and 8 p. m. Sunday School at 10 a. m. The evening service will be in part in English. The members of the church are showing much interest, and indicate it by renovating and improving their building, as well as by a better attendance at church services.

Decrees of divorce were handed down Tuesday by Judge McBride in the Circuit court as follows: Celeste Moore vs. George Moore, because of alleged drunkenness and desertion. The plaintiff is allowed the custody of the children and \$35 per month alimony. Elizabeth Avery was freed from the marital yoke which has bound her to George Avery, the complaint alleging cruel and inhuman treatment. Floyd Rethlefsen was given a divorce from Henry Rethlefsen on account of wilful desertion and allowed to resume her maiden name of Floyd Lowe. Lettie Poyser secured a decree from Frank Poyser, whom she accused of wilful desertion without cause.

Hal Rands left Thursday for Clarke's Point, Idaho, where he will complete a government survey begun by him last year, amounting to a \$5000 contract. The land to be surveyed lies partly in the Oeur d'Alene mining region and part in the vicinity of Clarke's Point. He took with him William Califf of this city, and expects to finish the work in three weeks, when he will return here. Although the land lies in the mountains, the snow is off at this season and the feed is good for pack horses. The season when work can be done is necessarily short there, and he was driven out last fall without completing the work.

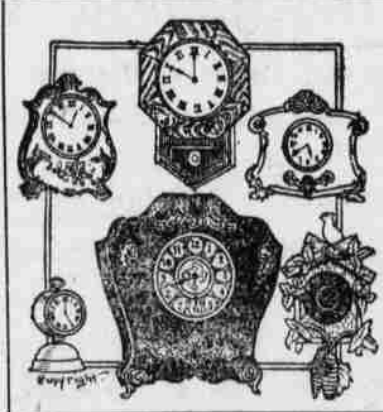
