The tanks will be of steel and have a capacity of 30,000 gallons. They will be placed near the Willamette mill and work has already commenced clearing away the rock for a foundation for the concrete.

Big Log Drive.  
One of the largest log drives ever undertaken in this county will be made this week from Coal creek to Bagby's mill, a distance of 30 miles. At this season of the year the water is low and to overcome the difficulty three dams have been built, two in Coal creek and one in Butte creek. The former will raise the water to the height of twenty-four feet. The logs are already in the stream and when all is ready the flood will be released and it is expected that the logs will be carried a considerable distance down the stream. Flooding the streams three times in this manner with the great volume of water collected in the improvised reservoirs is expected to bring the logs to their destination. Much curiosity and interest is felt by residents along the streams as to the success of the plan.

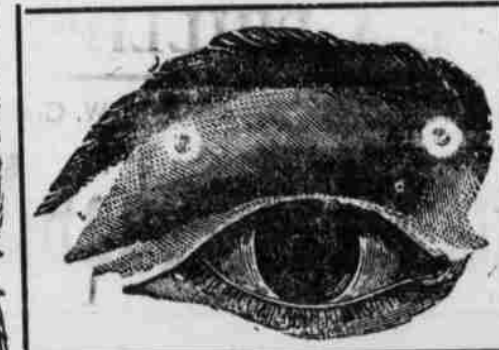
