This disaster has been averted by the action of a patriotic order of women, which has secured the money for the purpose of building a tunnel under the historic mansion in order to divert the stream. This work is now being performed at a cost of seven thousand dollars, and will soon be completed. ### CLIMATE AND CROP REPORT.

#### GENERAL SUMMARY.

The past week has been dry, with cool nights and dry winds. All growing crops need rain, and unless it comes soon spring grain and the second crop of hay will be unusually light. A heavy frost occurred Friday morning in the eastern high level sections, and tender vegetables were badly nipped and some grain was damaged. On the same morning light frosts were reported in a number of localities west of the Cascades, but they did no material harm.

Fall grain is filling nicely, but spring grain is heading short. Haying has made rapid progress during the week, but nearly everywhere the returns show a falling off from previous expectations. Pastures are drying up, but feed is still good and stock continues in excellent condition.

Hops, gardens, field onions, potatoes and corn, although needing rain, have made fairly good progress during the week. Early potatoes are being marketed. The season so far has been remarkably free from insect pests.

The strawberry crop turned out fairly satisfactory, although it was not so heavy as it would have been had there been more rain earlier in the season. Apples continue promising and the outlook for peaches is fairly good. The yield of cherries is better than expected.

"For the best article appearing in the regular edition of any newspaper or other publication printed outside of the State of Oregon, to be completed for only by persons residing in Oregon and not living in the City of Portland, choice of a gold medal or \$50 in cash.

"For the second best article, either the gold medal or \$50 in cash.

"Article winning third prize will be given \$25.

"Fourth prize will be \$15, the fifth prize \$10.

"To residents of Portland a gold medal and \$100 will be distributed in prizes upon exactly the same basis as the gold medal and \$100 are to be distributed to residents of Oregon outside of Portland.

"The reason for having these articles printed outside of the state is that we want the people away from home to know our advantages, and then we want the Portland and Oregon papers to be relieved from any embarrassment that might arise through having to decline articles. Articles containing the expression 'Webfoot' will not be allowed to compete.

"The Governor of the state will be asked to appoint a committee to decide as to the winners in the state contest, while the Mayor of Portland will be requested to name the committee that will select the winners in this city.

"One of the chief reasons for offering these prizes is to give the younger generation an opportunity to do some pleasant work during vacation. This is a busy age and no article is desired exceeding 6000 words—those of about 1000 words preferred.

"No articles will be accepted in competition except where the newspaper or other publication is submitted complete. The articles submitted become the property of the Portland Commercial Club, to be used as desired.

"The contest closes October 1, 1904.

"We believe that there will be an interesting competition for these prizes, and feel sure that many newspapers throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico and other countries will be glad to secure interesting matter relative to the most fertile state in the Pacific Northwest. Articles in any language will be accepted.
