Fatal Accident At Dodge.

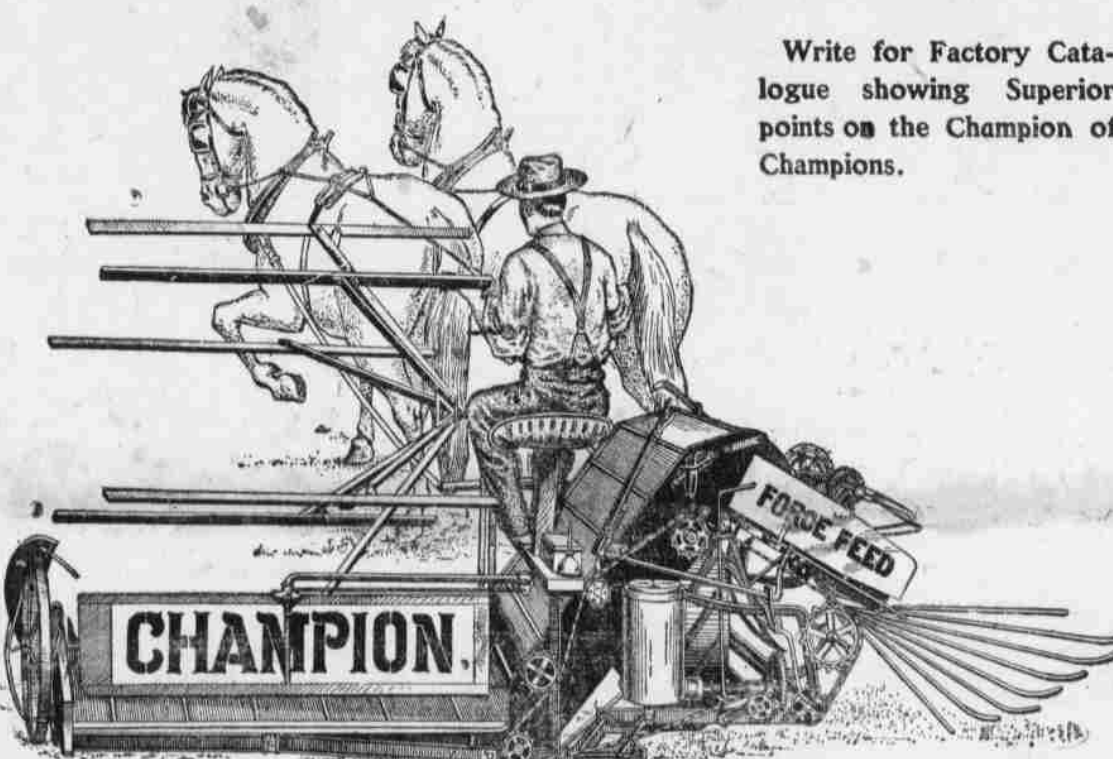
