The funeral of Mrs. Sophia Dickelmann, who died at Salem Wednesday, will take place at the Dickelmann residence on the corner of Eleventh and Washington streets at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Interment will be in the New Era cemetery.

Manager Shark, of the Oregon City Colts, is trying to arrange a game between a nine from Rogue River League and the Oregon State League, the game to take place on the Canemah Park diamond Sunday afternoon. Since the dissolution of these leagues, it is thought likely that representatives of the two aggregations can be brought together for a game here.

The city authorities have ordered a few thousand feet of timber and plank with which to block up the unsafe roadway below the Congregational church on Main street. It is expected that a fill will be made there as soon as the underground crossing at the Southern Pacific tracks for the south end road is made, as it is thought that that cut will furnish enough dirt to fill the gulch.

The Direct Primary Nominations League has issued a statement of expenses incurred in the distribution of circulars, letters and folders. The total expenses of the league have been \$1710.52. The whole amount of subscriptions is \$1580, so there is a deficit of \$130.52. It is hoped that friends of the measure will contribute sufficient funds to pay this indebtedness. The members of the League, especially the Secretary, Mr. W. S. U'Ren, have sacrificed much time and no little money in helping on this work in the interests of good government.

Letters have been received in this city by Mayor Dimick and County Judge Ryan from the Oregon Development League, a movement which has been lately started by prominent men throughout the state to secure the promotion of the best interests of the entire state. As soon as the Chautauqua is over and the local business men can be gotten together, the local Board of Trade will be asked to meet and take action on the proposition. The letters received state that prior to this time the movements calculated to promote the material interests of the state have been local in character and not productive of the best results on that account. It is believed that with a general movement better results will be obtained.

Judge Ryan and Mayor Dimick have appointed representatives from this city and county to attend the meeting of the Oregon Development League in Portland on August 2 and 3. Prominent men in different parts of the county and from this city have been chosen to attend the sessions of the league, when it will assume definite shape and make plans for the good of the entire state. Those appointed by Judge Ryan are: G. W. Prosser, Oswego; Chas. Toozee, Wilsonville; William Lewellyn, Springfield; O. T. Howard, Mulino; F. A. Rosencrans, Canby; T. B. Killen, Needby; A. Mather, Clackamas; J. J. Roots, Boring; J. T. Apperson, Parkplace and J. B. Huntington, Estacada. Mayor Dimick appointed H. E. Cross, J. J. Cooke, C. D. Latourette, C. H. Dye and John Adams delegates from this city.
