Molalla, Or., July 27, 1904.—Hay harvest is finished in this section and the cutting of grain has commenced. Fall grain looks as though it ought to yield fairly well, but spring grain though not an entire failure is the poorest for a number of years. Some are cutting spring grain for hay.

They report they killed five or six deer, some of them being very large. 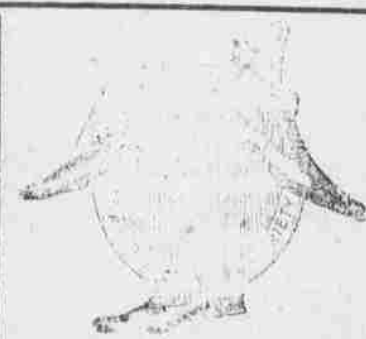

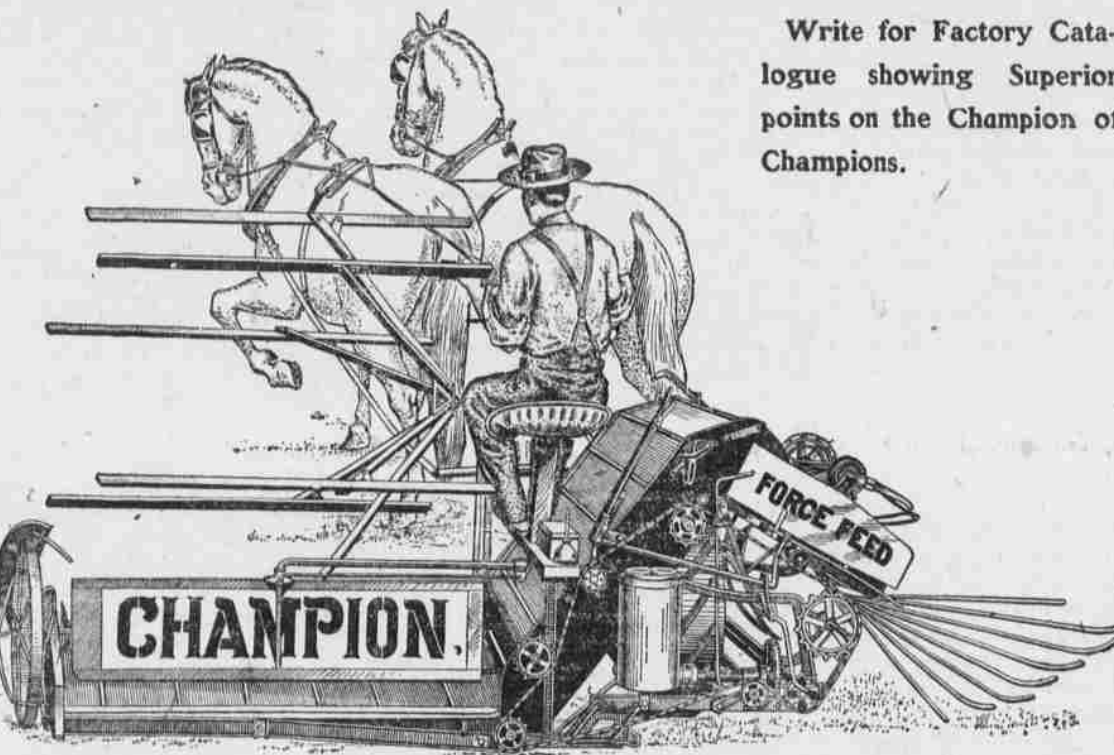
