RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED.

Preliminary Work On Clackamas County Exhibit in 1905.

Oregon City, Or., Oct. 6, 1904. To the Honorable County Court of Clackamas County, Oregon, Gentlemen:—We your committee heretofore appointed to recommend and report a systematic plan for an exhibit of the resources of Clackamas county, Oregon, at the Lewis and Clark Exposition in Portland, in 1905, beg leave to submit the following:

First:—We recommend that the County Court appoint at this term a permanent committee of one from each precinct in the county, to have entire charge of the collection and the making of the exhibit.

Second:—That the various members of this committee be notified of their appointment by the County Clerk.

Third:—That a full meeting of this committee be called to meet for organization, at the County Court room in Oregon City on Saturday October 15th, at one o'clock p. m.

Fourth:—That this committee be advised to appoint an executive committee of nine members, who shall have the special and immediate charge of the work of the general committee, and with such other and various duties as shall be put upon them by the full committee.

Fifth:—That the general and executive committee set without compensation, but may employ skilled or other help at such salary as may be agreed upon.

Sixth:—That no indebtedness, nor expenditure shall be made beyond the amount of money available and no bills shall be paid except they be first audited by the executive committee.

Seventh:—That the county judge act as ex-officio chairman of the general committee and each of the other members of the county court be members of the full committee beyond the number heretofore provided.

Isaac Shoilidge, wife and child are visiting the former's parents of this place.

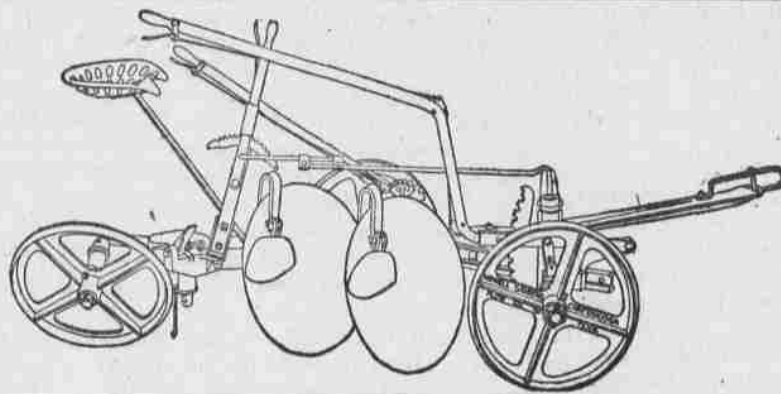
Mr. Stevens will have his new house ready to move into in the near future.
