INCREASE OF
MILL OUTPUT

Pulp and Paper Company
Installs New Machinery

\$500,000 ALREADY SPENT

Capacity of Willamette Sawmill Will Be 150,000 Feet Per Day When Construction Work Is Ended.

The capacity of the sawmill of the Willamette Pulp & Paper Co. is being increased to 150,000 feet per day, which will make it one of the largest mills on the coast. New machinery is now being installed. To utilize this greatly increased output, the number of grinders in the pulp mills will be increased to 50. Nineteen grinders have been used heretofore and 32 more will be added.

The capacity of the Willamette Mills will probably be increased by one and one-half with the new machinery. More digestors will probably be placed in the pulp mills and one or two new machines in the paper manufacturing department. A small army of workmen is now employed in construction work, and over half a million dollars has been expended already this year. When the improvements are complete, over 100 men will be added to the permanent working force of the mills, which is now over 500.

Oswego People in Court.

The time of the county court was taken up entirely Wednesday afternoon by a number of residents of Oswego. That village is just at present excited over the petition of Henry Jaques for a license to sell liquor. As Oswego is not incorporated, these matters come before the Clackamas county court. If the remonstrance is greater than the petition, the applicant is turned down and if the same names are on both the petition and remonstrance, the law considers that they be counted for the remonstrance, as that paper is supposed to have been circulated after the petition was presented and so represents the sober second thought of the people. The court discovered that the remonstrance had been circulated before the petition had been made to the court and after haggling all the afternoon, the court passed up the question to the interested parties and their attorneys and continued the case until today. Jaques applied for a license about two months ago, but the remonstrance was so great that he was refused and he is now having a second try at it, with the hope that public sentiment has changed in his favor. He has operated a saloon at Oswego for a number of years.

Butcher Business Sold.
