

PORTLAND CAPITAL WITHDREW.

Temporary Embarrassment of Lumber Company Followed.

Appointment of N. Crittenden, of Aurora, to the receivership of the Bagby Lumber Company is understood to be the first step that will lift the company from its present financial difficulties to a firm business footing, and preliminary arrangements are already being made with the creditors for the resumption of business by the corporation itself.

Frank S. L. Bagby, who formerly operated a sawmill at Needy, was induced by the Pacific Export Lumber Company, of Portland, to move his plant to Aurora, and Alexander Campbell, of the Portland company, agreed to take \$8000 worth of stock in the corporation, which was formed by Bagby, who, depending upon the promise of the Portland capitalists secured financial assistance of C. Dye, A. Todd, and others. The loan men put their money in the business and purchased stock, and afterwards Campbell and Alexander withdrew their subscriptions for stock in the corporation and refused to pay over the money, because of the forced retirement of Mr. Alexander from the Portland field on account of ill health. In the meantime plans had been made by Mr. Bagby and his associates for an enlargement of the business. The mill was moved from Needy to Aurora, new machinery was procured, and the promoters looked on having \$8000 from the Pacific Export Lumber Company to meet the increased expenditures.

The corporation had already committed itself to a larger and broader policy than their capital permitted, and it was up to them to get rid of the unexpected blow that they had suffered through the defection of the Portland capitalists. Numerous creditors were pressing them and the concern was threatened with insolvency, when Mr. Bagby stepped into the breach and filed a suit for \$450 due him for services and asked the courts to appoint a receiver.

The mill is in good condition, nearly all of the machinery is new, and the location is unsurpassed on railroad and water. The corporation has valuable water rights on several creeks and stumpage contracts and is in a position to operate profitably.

Suits to Quiet Title.

Two suits to quiet title of land have been filed in the circuit court. Julia F. Johnston has commenced action against Charles G. Reynolds and the American Automatic Lighting Co. The plaintiff alleges she is the owner of the south half of section 22, township 4 south of range 5 east in Clackamas county, and that the defendant wrongfully claims an interest in the property, which is in the possession of the plaintiff.

Mrs. Hattie L. Westall, Agnes Sweet, Mrs. M. Sweet, Lula A. Sweet, Gay L. Sweet and Milton W. Smith, as administrators of the estate of Lodiema Sweet, deceased, have sued Clackamas county, alleging that Lodiema Sweet, who died Dec. 28, 1904, was the owner of lot 3, section 31, township 1 south of range 5 east, containing 39.9 acres. The county claims an interest in the property on account of delinquent taxes on blocks 2, 3, 7 and 8, in Unavilla for 1899, 1900, 1902, 1903 and 1904. The town of Unavilla was vacated by an order of the court August 8, 1895, but the plaintiffs have been assessed for blocks 2, 3, 7 and 8. The assessment is alleged to be void for the reason that it is a double assessment and for the further reason that Unavilla has been vacated as re-

gards the said blocks. The property was also assessed to the wrongful owners. The plaintiffs ask that the title be quieted.

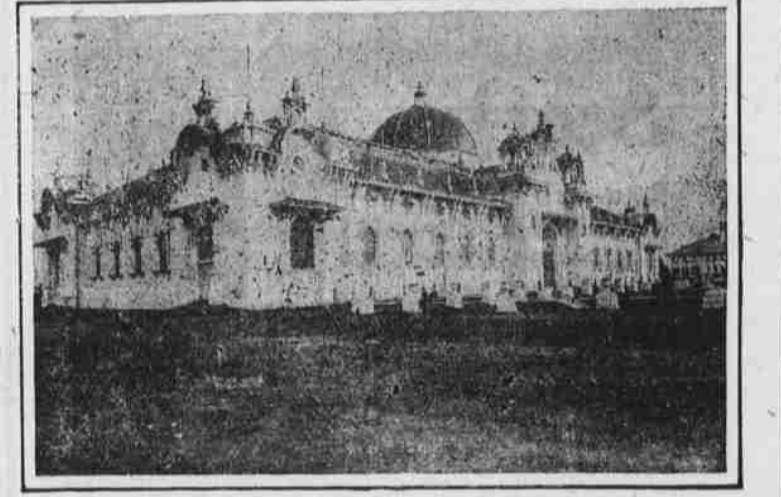

AGRICULTURAL PALACE.



The Palace of Agriculture at the Lewis and Clark Exposition is the largest structure on the grounds, being 460 by 210 feet in size. A feature of the structure is a great dome which rises from its center and which can be seen from every part of the grounds. The dome is covered with green translucent fibre. Its great ribs and the final which crowns it are thickly studded with electric globes, which at night sheds a glow of light visible from many points in the city. In the center of each side of the building is a lofty pavilion, rising above the high circular arched doorway and terminating in a classic arch which is surmounted by a niche between a pair of richly ornamented pilasters, sheltered by a broad cornice which is a continuation of that of the central arch. Statues occupy these niches. On each corner of the pavilion is a small turret, with a single classic arch on each of its four sides surmounted by a dome roof with a finial on its center.
