Messrs. Harry Bair, George Penman and Howard Eccles were Portland visitors Thursday.

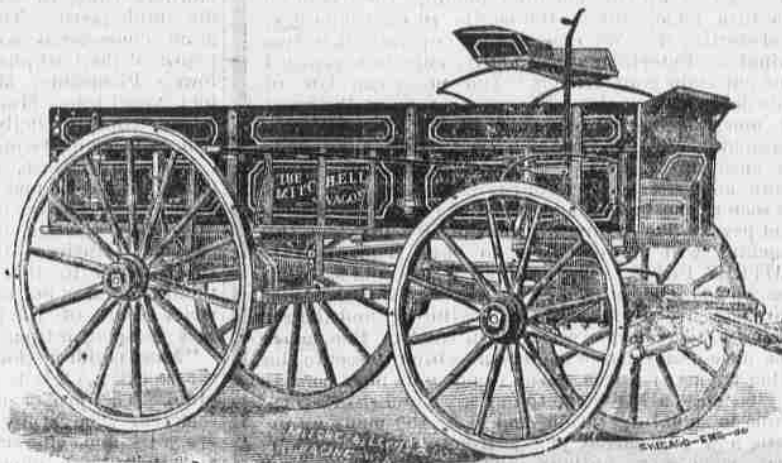
